Having presented over 60 First time events/ initiatives to the SISD Board of Trustees and community that include the first exemplary schools, the first TEA Recognized District rating, the founding of an Education Foundation, the first Virtual High School, Ninth Grade Academy, along with

the successful completion of about 40 million dollars in construction are evidence of the exceptional servant leadership team that has been built. We prepared for potentially explosive growth in our area and with Tx. A&M as our neighbor, we are participating fully in the development and support of their teaching and leadership programs. Southside ISD was the first district in the County to go to iPads.
