Since my humble beginning in the fire service in October 1989, I have spent my entire adult life as a fire and EMS provider, leader, mentor, and problem solver. In recent years, I have earned the designations of Executive Fire Officer from the National Fire Academy as well as Chief Fire Officer and Chief Medical Officer Designations from the Commission on Fire Officer Designation. Currently, I am conducting research for my Doctoral dissertation, focusing on the effects that the CPSE Chief Fire Officer Designation program has on the professional advancement of credentialed fire officers.

As the College Station Fire Chief, I was responsible for leading, planning, organizing, establishing organizational strategy, and modeling values while directing all fire department activities including fire operations, fire prevention, emergency medical services, stakeholder presence in a regional EOC, and supervision of EMS billing. I prepared the annual budget, which is approximately \$20 million dollars. I was responsible for the life safety of 125,000 citizens, millions of visitors, and 65,000 students over an area of 50 square miles. The College Station Fire Department has an ISO Class 1 rating, and the department is Internationally Accredited by the Center for Fire Accreditation International.

I was responsible for the leadership of 6 fire stations, 161 personnel, and 6 divisions: Administration, Operations, Prevention, EMS, Finance, and Organizational Resources. The Administration is further broken down into 8 sections including, Training, Billing, Disaster Preparedness, Personnel, Fleet Maintenance, Facilities, Airport, and Special Operations.

Additionally, I established the mission, vision, and goals while maintaining all policies and procedures. As Chief Administrative Officer of this all-hazards fire protection agency, I was fully responsible for all emergency services and programs. My main areas of responsibility are in the following broad categories:

My strengths as fire chief are in human behavior, leadership, strategic assessments, and stakeholder relationships, both internal and external. I have a diverse skillset involving labor relations; during my 6-year tenure as fire chief, I collaborated with three separate IAFF bargaining units. I value relationships and understand that fire departments cannot operate entirely by a spreadsheet; qualitative relationships and community support are as important as quantitative analytics. I believe in deliverables—problem solving must have metrics in place to determine effectiveness from the field to city hall. Positive outputs result in positive outcomes.

Fire Chief / Regional Director Rural Metro Fire Department Tucson, AZ 2013-2017

From 2013 to 2017, I was the Fire Chief and Regional Director for Rural Metro Fire Department and Southwest Ambulance consolidated operations in Pima and Yuma County, Arizona. The consolidated operations responded to 90,000 calls for service in 2016 and transported 78,000 patients.

As Fire Chief I was responsible for leading, planning, organizing, establishing organizational strategy, and modeling values while directing all fire department activities including fire operations, fire prevention / community risk reduction, emergency medical services, stakeholder presence in a regional EOC, and a regional EMS billing program. As Fire Chief/Regional Director for Rural Metro I prepared the annual budget, which was approximately \$90 million for both Pima and Yuma Counties. I was responsible for the life safety of one million citizens over an area of 141 square miles of fire protection and 308 square miles for EMS service in Pima County alone. The fire service area has ISO ratings ranging from 2 to 5, and a fire protection/life safety cost of \$0.19 per square foot.

I oversaw 3 Assistant Chiefs, 3 Deputy Chiefs, 2 full-scale community risk reduction divisions, and a dispatch center that dispatches for several other agencies and was a primary and secondary PSAP. I was also in charge of the ambulance division that provided service with 35 ambulances daily, providing ALS, BLS, and critical care/RN transports in emergent and non-emergent settings.

I was responsible for the leadership of six major divisions: Administration, Operations, Prevention, EMS, Finance, and Organizational Resources. The Administration is further broken down into seven sections including, Training, Billing, Disaster Preparedness, Personnel, Fleet Maintenance, Facilities, and Special Operations.

Pima and Yuma County Fire Departments operate out of 14 fire stations, capable of responding with 14 Engine Companies, 2 Truck Companies (all ALS), 3 Type 6 and Type 3 Wildland Engines, 7 Water Tenders, 1 Heavy Rescue Unit, with Regional TRT and Hazmat team assets, 2 Hazardous Materials Units (1 in Pima and 1 in Yuma County), and 10 ALS Ambulances. I was also responsible for our Metropolitan Medical Response System (MMRS), a FEMA asset, with members trained to operate the decontamination and mass causality components of the MMRS. In addition, we had 2 Quick Response Vehicles, and an All Risk Command Vehicle. The QRV concept produced enhanced service delivery to residents while lowering overall operating costs.
