ENGL 1101-A: Composition I for international students. A composition course focused on skills required for effective writing in the context of American universities, emphasizing exposition, analysis, and argumentation, and introducing basic research skills.

ENGL 1102: Composition II. A composition course focused on writing skills beyond the levels of proficiency required by ENGL 1101 emphasizing interpretation and evaluation and incorporating a variety of more advanced research skills. Gamified in Spring 2016.

ENGL 1102-A: Composition II for international students. A composition course focusing on research and argumentation in the context of American universities, emphasizing interpretation and evaluation and incorporating a variety of more advanced research skills.

ENGL 2010: Writing in the Professions. A professional writing course designed to introduce students to writing and reading in the academic disciplines and related professions.

### **Lake Michigan College (2009 – Present)**

ENGL 103: Technical Writing Online. An online class designed to help students write with greater skill, confidence and effectiveness on the job. Writing assignments develop the ability to analyze specific audiences, purposes, and situations, and to use appropriate content, organization, style, and format. 2014 - Present.

ENGL 093: English Fundamentals. A face-to-face developmental writing course focused on the basic mechanics of grammar and style, focusing on sentence, paragraph, and essay forms.

ENGL 101: Composition I. A face-to-face composition course focused on expository writing and the closely related activities of critical reading and thinking. Primary attention was given to formal elements of short essays based upon or incorporating documented source material.

ENGL 102: Composition II. A face-to-face second-semester composition course focused on an extension and intensification of elements of expository writing and critical reading and

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thinking covered in ENGL 101.

ENGL 103: Technical Writing. A face-to-face second-semester FYC course designed to help students write with greater skill, confidence and effectiveness on the job.

### **Ivy Tech Community College – Elkhart (2009 – 2013)**

Selected curriculum design elements: text-based research and inquiry, multimodal composition; adherence to Quality Matters design principles 2012 - 2013.

ENGL 111: English Composition. A face-to-face composition course with an emphasis on the various forms of expository writing such as process, description, narration, comparison, analysis, persuasion, and argumentation.

ENGL 111-R: English Composition Online. An online composition course with an emphasis on the various forms of expository writing such as process, description, narration, comparison, analysis, persuasion, and argumentation.

ENGL 112: Exposition and Persuasion. A face-to-face second-semester composition course built on the writing skills taught in ENGL 111 and emphasizing research-based analytic and argumentative writing.
