Group Activities

To assure class participation the class will be divided into groups of three or fouir. Please feel free to assemble your group of your choosing ASAP. Groups will be assigned specific portions of the text or end of chapter questions to solve. Last semester students used short power points to assist in this effort. This will require the use of your computer, camera, and microphone.

I adopted this strategy when we went on line. The idea was to avoid your watching my talking head for the entire class via computer which is boring. This involved the entire class and broke the monotony of online by moving from group to group. I also allowed students to work on power point skills and their presentation technique. The result was that my SRI scores improved by a whole half point. Feedback was that the students enjoyed the experience and it made the class seem to go much faster. And this is not a debit credit class, it is a matter of learning a process and should be a discussion type environment.

Make up and late Assignment exam and quiz policy

A vital part of every student's education is regular attendance of class meetings (for face-to-face/hybrid/online synchronous classes) or regular review of class materials posted by the instructor for asynchronous classes. Any absences tend to lower the quality of a student's work, and frequent or persistent absences may result in a failing grade. Students are responsible for the materials covered in class. The course covers a lot of material and most students find at least some parts of it difficult. Class participation is highly encouraged as it makes the class more interesting and enhances the learning experience. Students are strongly encouraged to ask questions, participate in class discussions and problem solving, and visit/contact the instructor during office hours in case of questions or concerns. Good attendance and participation may be rewarded when final grades are assigned.

The course is intensive and challenging and you are expected to master the materials presented in class. The structure of the class makes your individual study and preparation outside of class extremely important, and may vary considerably based on student background. However, a **minimum** of two hours of work outside the class is expected for every one hour of class period per week. Reading the assigned chapter(s) and having some familiarity with them before class will be very useful for understanding lectures.

- 5. A student has the responsibility to check their university email for any updates or official university notification.
- 6. We expect that students will behave in a manner that is dignified, respectful, and courteous to all people, regardless of sex, ethnic/racial origin, religious background, sexual orientation or disability. Behaviors that infringe on the rights of another individual will not be tolerated.
