**Lecture Course Description as per the Academic Course Guide Manual of The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB):** Anatomy and Physiology I is the first part of a two-course sequence. It is a study of the structure and function of the human body including cells, tissues, and organs of the following systems: integumentary, skeletal, muscular, nervous, and special senses. Emphasis is on interrelationships among systems and regulation of physiological functions involved in maintaining homeostasis.

Attendance for lectures is equivalent to a lecture exam grade.

Additionally, this course assesses the following student/institutional learning outcomes as required by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB):

- Communication: Expressing ideas through effective written, oral, and visual communication.
- Teamwork: Considering different points of view and working effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal.
- Critical Thinking: Exploring issues, ideas, artifacts, and events before accepting or formulating an opinion or conclusion.
- Empirical and Quantitative Skills: Applying scientific and mathematical concepts to analyze and solve problems.

- 1. Use anatomical terminology to identify and describe locations of major organs of each system covered.
- 2. Explain interrelationships among molecular, cellular, tissue, and organ functions in each system.
- 3. Describe the interdependency and interactions of the systems.
- 4. Explain contributions of organs and systems to the maintenance of homeostasis.
- 5. Identify causes and effects of homeostatic imbalances.
- 6. Describe modern technology and tools used to study anatomy and physiology.

deduction. McGraw-Hill work completed after the due date will post as no credit. Your instructor

## **Process for Drops or Withdrawals:**

- Prior to the Census Date (noted in the schedule): Faculty will process drops for students who have never attended in person since the first day of class.

Students engaging in an act that violates the standards of academic integrity will find themselves facing academic and/or disciplinary sanctions. Academic misconduct is any act, or attempt, which gives an unfair advantage to the student. Additionally, any behavior specifically prohibited by a faculty member in the course syllabus or class discussion may be considered as academic misconduct. Academic misconduct includes, but is not limited to, cheating, plagiarism,

prohibited use of artificial intelligence, multiple submissions, collusion, lying and bribery. For more information, refer to the Student Code of Conduct, Article III: Conduct Rules and Regulations. Texas A&M University-San Antonio faculty has the discretion to impose grade penalties as deemed necessary.

Faculty members are required to report such serious breaches of academic honesty to their chair, their dean and the Office of Student Rights and Responsibilities. In cases of academic misconduct, students may be subject not only to grade sanctions in courses but to disciplinary action. Grade sanctions may be imposed only by faculty members, but suspension or expulsion may be imposed only by the Vice President for Student Affairs. If a student wishes to appeal the decision of suspension or expulsion due to violations of academic misconduct, they must initiate their appeal as outlined within the Student Code of Conduct. Extenuating circumstances may cause the University to deviate from the defined time frames.

All student term papers and other written assignments are subject to analysis by anti-plagiarism and anti-AI software. Posting of any class work given to student, or solutions, or discussion, on publicly accessible forums, social media, or artificial intelligence is not permissible. Considering the potential consequences of academic misconduct, it is obviously in students' best interests to avoid even the appearance of such behavior. If a student is unclear whether a specific act might constitute academic misconduct, please she/he should contact the instructor for an assessment of the situation.
