Learning Outcomes

- Analyze the security of cryptographic protocols, identifying potential vulnerabilities and proposing improvements using formal methods and cryptographic theory.

- Evaluate the effectiveness of different cryptographic systems in various real-world scenarios, including cloud security and blockchain, by conducting hands-on experiments and case studies.
- Design a custom cryptographic protocol or secure communication system that meets specific security requirements, incorporating appropriate cryptographic techniques and standards.
- Demonstrate the ability to solve complex cryptographic problems, such as those involving modular arithmetic, discrete logarithms, or elliptic curves, through both theoretical analysis and practical exercises.

Weekly Assignment Availability and Due Dates: You will receive a minimum of 1 week to complete all assignments. All assignments will be submitted in Blackboard. Due dates for assignments will be clearly indicated in Blackboard. Assignments, unless noted, should be submitted as ONE DOCUMENT in docx/pdf format unless otherwise noted.

Deadline/Late Policy: This assignment is to be completed and submitted through Blackboard no later than the deadline/due-date indicated on the Blackboard. Contact your Instructor immediately using the Blackboard Inbox located in the upper right corner or by email if you require any assistance. If for technical or personal reasons, you miss the deadline/due date, you may submit the assignment up until, but no later than, the lockout date. Assignments are not accepted for any reason after the lockout date and there are no makeup assignments. Missing assignments are recorded as a zero grade. Understand that if you miss the lockout date, even by a minute for technical or personal reasons you are late. Send your Instructor a message through Blackboard Inbox on or before the due/deadline to get assistance so there is time to respond and for you to take the appropriate actions in order to complete and submit the assignment. 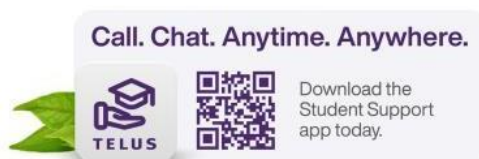

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance: According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance.
