First Year Seminar (FYS)

Texas A&M University-San Antonio | Fall 2024

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Course Description (from the A&M-SA Course Catalog)

This course is designed to assist first-year students in adjusting to university expectations through enhancing quantitative reasoning skills and acquiring essential skills for academic success.

Course Overview

This course is designed to assist first-year students in adjusting to university expectations, acquiring essential academic success skills, and exploring different career paths. The course focuses on accessing university resources and developing self-awareness, agency, and personal responsibility. Students will also become active members of the campus community.

In this project-based seminar, we focus on the development of the toilet and its impact on sanitation and public health from the earliest biblical accounts to the present day and beyond. Class discussions will draw on news articles, blogs, and selections from scientific papers that will examine the impact of human activity on Texas water bodies and ecosystems. We will approach access to toilets as a social justice issue both as a public health threat as well as a threat to public safety, particularly that of women around the world. Students will learn about how toilet design and use differ across our globe according to cultural, economic, and political differences. Lastly, students will learn about current developments in improving sanitation and toilet access and how intrepid and creative individuals are developing ways to make money from poop.

Assignments will include weekly reflective blogs, activities, and a collaborative project to map and describe public toilets across San Antonio. At the end of the course, we will assess how this course has affected your perception of how toilets have impacted humans from the perspectives of public health, social justice, aesthetics, and design.

Most importantly, this is one-half of a learning community. We'll partner classes with Introduction to Philosophy taught by Dr. Harris Betchol. We'll be drawing connections and making reflections in both classes.

Course Promises

This course makes a set of promises to you (assuming you fulfill the expectations below). By the end of the semester, you should be able to:

- 1. Exhibit growth in self-awareness, agency, and personal responsibility
- 2. To develop close reading, visual literacy, discussion, research and writing, quantitative reasoning, and *synthesis* skills by engaging with a range of critical and creative works.
- 3. Adapt and apply appropriate academic strategies to courses and learning experiences
- 4. Identify and apply strategies to effectively manage time and priorities
- 5. Identify relevant academic policies, processes, and resources relevant to your academic success
- 6. Develop goal-setting strategies to enhance academic and career readiness.
- 7. To develop advising relationships with faculty, peer mentors, and the Center for Student Success.
- 8. To participate in the learning communities of the first-year seminar/workshop, the college, and the university, so as to develop a sense of belonging and engagement.
- 9. To recognize the various beneficial and deleterious impacts of the toilet on humans, and the environment over the course of human history and onwards into our futures.
- 10. To recognize the impact of toilets and sanitation systems and access to toilets as a social justice issue.
- 11. Work as a team to develop a project to support toilet access in Texas

Course Expectations

This course will only fulfill these promises if you promise the following in return:

Attend classes. This course will rely largely on class content and discussion. For this format to succeed, you must be present AND on time. You will earn an absence if you arrive 15 or more minutes after class has started. Excessive tardiness will also be penalized. You will receive points for attendance and many in and out of class assignments will be contingent on information from class. To earn full participation points, you must attend class and actively participate. You may miss up to four classes. Five absences may result in you being dropped from the course. If you need to miss more than 4 days due to extracurricular activities, communication must be provided (by your organization's coach or advisor/sponsor).

To be attentive and participate in class. I expect all students to actively participate during class both verbally and nonverbally. Participation does not simply mean speaking, although that is essential. I realize there are a variety of ways students can participate (e.g., following discussions with your eyes and ears, asking questions, sharing, reading, writing, individual reflection, presenting, and collaborating). I hope that you will strive to stretch yourselves beyond your preferred ways of learning and your comfort

zone. I encourage you to contribute thoughtful comments and questions, as well as to listen carefully to your peers' contributions and respectfully respond to others' comments. The success of our mutual learning from each other depends upon preparation and active participation in all aspects of the course.

To complete required assignments promptly. Assignments provide you with both informal and formal opportunities to articulate your responses to the issues and topics we will discuss. You will get the most out of the course if you turn in your work on time. Extensions require at least a full day's advance notice prior to due dates and approval from me. You must follow basic grammar rules to get full credit for assignments. No matter how short or long the response, make sure you check for grammar and standards of academic writing. All responses are a reflection of you and are intended to prepare you for academic and professional writing.

Late Work Policy: Except for the final project, you can request an extension on all assignments. I will give you 3 extra days to complete assignments that you request an extension. Assignments are closed on Blackboard after the extension deadline and will no longer be accepted.

Assignments and Evaluations

To be successful in this course you are expected to complete all assignments on time. Assignments must be submitted to the correct location to be considered on time. Assignments will be graded based on quantity and quality with rubrics for each assignment provided in Blackboard.

You are welcome to come to office hours regularly to discuss anything you like related to the course content, internships, problems with courses, etc. If you want to review assignments or readings and would like to use office hours to work through the challenges, we will work through them together but do this prior to the due date. You'll most often find me in the lab.

Extra Credit Opportunities

Throughout the semester, there will be many ways to earn extra credit. I will add 5 points to your Participation Grade if you take part in an extra credit opportunity + write a short reflection (1 paragraph) about your experience.
