Homework: Homework will be assigned from end-of-the-chapter problems in the textbook and/or from online homework associated with your textbook.

Calculators: Scientific calculators are required for this course. Programming mode is not allowed on exams.

Course Description

This is a one-semester course designed to introduce students to many chemical concepts, problems, and calculations used by analytical chemists. Principles and quantitative relationships in chemistry that may be introduced include chemical measurements, experimental error, statistics, quality assurance and calibration methods, electrical components, signal-to-noise, molecular spectroscopy, and separation methods. **Prerequisite:** CHEM 2323 and MATH 1314 with a grade of "C" or better **Corequisite:** 3131.

Learning Objectives

By the end of this course students will be able to:

- 1. Determine sources error and how to account for these errors.
- 2. Statistically analyze data.
- 3. Use calibration curves for quantitation.
- 4. Apply principles of equilibrium to quantitative chemical analysis.
- 5. Understand different types of titrations and their use in quantitative analysis.
- 6. Understand concepts of electrochemistry for quantitative analysis.
- 7. Understand spectrophotometry.

Student Responsibilities

Attendance Policy. All students are expected to attend all lectures and actively engage in class discussions, activities, and assignments. Attendance may be monitored. If you are absent, you are responsible for the material covered and are expected to get notes, announcements, and any other material from another student in the class.

Absences are excused if due to illness (medical excuse), death of an immediate family member, religious holiday (please inform instructor), official University activity, cancellation of classes, military duties, pregnancy & related conditions, or participation in legal proceedings. Excessive absences (more than 3) and tardiness may be penalized. Accumulation of more than three unexcused absences may result in a one letter grade reduction.

Conduct and Behavior. As an instructor, my goal is to create a safe and engaging learning environment. Class disruptions are unacceptable, asking questions to clarify material during class does not qualify as a disruption and is encouraged. If you disrupt the class, you will be asked to leave for the day. Technology in the classroom may be a great a resource but it can also hinder the learning process. Therefore, students are not allowed to wear ear buds and headphones and/or use cellphones during class. All cellphones must be on vibrate or turned off for the entirety of the class/lab period. In case of an emergency call, leave the room before answering the call. Texting/Tweeting/etc. during class is absolutely prohibited. The use of laptops, tablets, or other devices for nonclass related activities is not allowed.

Electronic Devices during Exams. All electronic devices must be completely stored during exams and quizzes, this does not include approved scientific calculators (see course materials). Academic misconduct and attempts to cheat during the exam will be pursued according to Texas A&M-San Antonio code of conduct policy. You are discouraged from leaving the room during an exam. If you need to use the restroom, ask and leave all electronic devices with the instructor.

Aggressive Behavior. The academic environment is meant for discussing ideas in a respectful manner. Tolerance, empathy, respect, and courtesy help us create a safe environment. Abusive and aggressive behavior will result in contacting the University Police Department and immediate removal of the student from the classroom.

Visitors. Only students enrolled in the course are allowed in the classroom. No visitors are allowed.

Grading

Your grade for the course is based on: Four 100-point exams and homework assignments (approximately 13) worth 25 points each.

These are the only opportunities for you to earn points throughout the semester. There are **no** opportunities for extra credit.

To calculate your grade, use the following equation: $\left(\frac{\Sigma(\text{Points earned})}{\text{Total points}}\right) * 100$

All homework/exam grades will be posted to Blackboard. However, Blackboard course percentages are not considered as official, and students should use caution when using those to evaluate overall course grades.
