Course Objectives: The objective of the course is to understand the modern tools and methods used in economic decision-making and apply those in various business set up. The course is designed for the students with limited background in economics or business. The focus of the course is on the study of macroeconomic variables, monetary and fiscal policy, and other economic issues.

Prerequisites: None

Student Learning Outcomes:

After successful completion of this course, students will be able to: (1) understand, interpret, and evaluate the key macroeconomic variables, such as output, inflation, and employment; (2) how monetary policy works to steer the economy on its right path; (4) how fiscal policy set by the government could be used to stimulate the economy. The learner outcomes will be assessed by quizzes and exams.

<u>Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance:</u> According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance.
