# **Course Description and Material**

<u>Catalog Description</u>: In-depth study and applications of polynomial, rational, radical, exponential and logarithmic functions, and systems of equations using matrices. Additional topics such as sequences, series, probability, and conics may be included. This course meets the standards for the Mathematics category of courses under the core curriculum.

<u>Prerequisite</u>: Evidence of math equivalent to High School Algebra II ("C" or higher) or placement; Requires passing TSIA Math score.

<u>*Required Textbook*</u>: Online access code for *College Algebra* by Robert F. Blitzer (8<sup>th</sup> edition) with MyMathLab, Pearson Publishing (E-book included with access code).

\*\*Access codes are available in Blackboard, through the Brytewave link

OPTIONAL: Students can purchase a loose-leaf version of text for a low cost if desired (check bookstore).

<u>Required Equipment</u>: TI-30 series scientific calculator or equivalent. (Graphing calculators, programmable calculators, smartphones, tablets, and computers are not allowed during exams.)

Student Learning Outcomes: Upon completion of this course, students will:

1. Demonstrate understanding and knowledge of properties of functions, including domain and range, operations, compositions, and inverses.

2. Recognize and apply polynomial, rational, radical, exponential, and logarithmic functions, and solve and explain related equations.

3. Interpret and apply graphing techniques.

4. Evaluate all roots of higher degree polynomial and rational functions.

5. Recognize, solve, apply and explain systems of linear equations using matrices

MATH 1314 helps students develop critical thinking, communication, and empirical and quantitative skills by focusing on student understanding of key algebraic concepts and appropriate applications related to everyday experience.

- 15. Rational functions and graphing (Section 3.5)
- 16. Introduction to polynomial and rational inequalities (Section 3.6)

**NOTE:** The class meets twice per week and recitation meets once per week. Aside from the four hours that you spend in class & lab each week, you should devote at least another 6~8 hours to studying on your own: reading the book and lecture notes, working out your homework assignments, and solving some extra related problems for practice. You are responsible for any and all materials/topics discussed in this class and in the assigned textbook sections.

# **Course Expectations and Requirements**

*Examinations*: There will be three exams during the semester: Exam 1 (8:00 September 26<sup>th</sup>), Exam 2 (8:00 October 31<sup>st</sup>) and the Final Exam (8:00 December 10<sup>th</sup>). Students are expected to take all three exams at the scheduled time. Exceptions for a legitimate reason may be granted by and must be approved by the instructor beforehand. In the event that a student misses an exam for unforeseen and

dire circumstances (hospitalization, death, nuclear war, ...), the final exam score *may* be used to replace the missing exam score at the instructor's discretion.

*Homework*: There will be approximately 20 homework assignments to be completed in the MyMathLab site provided by Pearson publishing company. These assignments will generally be due Sundays at 11:59 PM. Which homework assignments are due each week will be determined by the weekly progress in lectures. The assignments will be given in lectures.

<u>Reading Quizzes</u>: There will be ten Reading Quizzes for this course that are normally due prior to particular lectures.

Students can have group/team discussions about homework problems. However, each student must do his/her own work. Be mindful of academic integrity.

Examples of collaboration on homework:

1. A group of students studying together read a problem and then discuss verbally the techniques or strategies they will use to solve the problem. This level of cooperation is allowed.

2. One student writes a solution to a problem which other students then use as an example. This level of cooperation is NOT allowed.

No collaboration is allowed on quizzes.

**Classroom Etiquette:** Students are expected to refrain from distracting classmates as a result of off-task conversation, electronic devices, or other class interruptions.
