### **Catalog Description**

A general survey of music literature designed for the non-music major. Representative composers and their works are studied through recordings, lectures, reports, and live performances. The course focuses on the appreciation and analysis of musical compositions and performances, synthesis and interpretation of artistic expression and critical, creative and innovative communication about works of art. This course meets the standards for the Creative Arts category of courses under the core curriculum.

## **Student Learning Outcomes**

The goals of this course are as follows:

- Develop an appreciation of the complexities of music from various cultures around the world.
- Learn about the elements of music (pitch, rhythm, dynamics, tempo, etc.)
- Learn basic fundamentals of music including how to actively listen to music, how to read notation, and how to perform on a piano keyboard at an elementary level.
- Develop aural skills in recognizing composers and their nationalities, genres, historical periods and dates, & definitive features of selected musical examples.
- To develop academic writing, research, creativity, and communication skills that can be useful in other coursework.

### **Grading Descriptions**

### **Reading Assignments:**

Students have access to all three textbooks as e-books through the Connect platform. Reading assignments (which can also be heard in audiobook form) will be given each week for students to complete on their own time every week. Reading assignments will be accompanied by comprehension questions which will be factored into the reading assignment grade.

**Lecture Summaries:** For each lecture video, students will be required to give a short summary/synopsis with at least (3-5) key takeaways per video. Students will be graded on the detail and accuracy of their summaries each week.

Online Music Explorations These online music activities are a way for students to have time to explore fun music activities to help solidify their understanding of the basic fundamentals of music. The website links are available on Blackboard. These assignments are graded based on participation, not performance. Students will be given guided instructions for each website which are available on Blackboard.

**Mid-Term:** There is no exam administered for the mid-term. Mid-term grades are a snapshot of the students current grade average at the 8-week mark during the semester. The mid-term grade is not an official grade, it is there to let students and admin know current standings mid-way through the semester.

**Final Exam:** The final exam is divided into (2) parts. A **presentation** and an accompanying **research paper**.

### Presentation (50 points)

The presentation portion of the exam is an opportunity for students to select a topic of their choice (pending approval of the instructor) to do a research project on. Presentation topics may include highlighting a formal composer from any time period or genre we have discussed in the class, or highlighting an international artist/group or instrument like we studied during the World Music portion of the course. Examples of presentation topics that have been done in the past are listed below. Do not be limited to these choices, they are just examples of topics that could be fun to research.

Ex: The Life and Music of Film Composer, John Williams.

Ex: Joe Hisashi & Music for Anime.

Ex: The History of Mariachi Music in Mexico.

Ex: The History of the Synthesizer and Its Role In Electronic Music.

For the presentation, students may use tools such as PowerPoint, Canva, Spotify, YouTube, etc. for their presentations. Students will be graded on the following:

- Proper selection of topic (composer, performer(s), or instrument).
- Listening and discussion of (3) musical selections.
- Use of musical vocabulary learned in class and from the readings.
- Overall preparation, organization, and quality of presentation.
- Effective communication skills delivering information.
- Aim for 5-7 slides max. Approx.10 minutes.
- Reply with comments/questions on at least (3) other presentations.

### Research Paper (50%)

The accompanying research paper should be 3-5 pages of content, include a separate source page, and be a comprehensive overview of the same composer or topic you chose for the presentation. This is an opportunity to go more in depth in explaining your topic since the presentation is more about the music. Be sure to include biographical information, and other relevant historical info relating to the composer or topic.

### Papers must contain:

- Name, date, class, word count, and proper title.
- 12 point font (Times New Roman).
- Double spaced
- 3-5 pages of text, include separate bibliography page.
- Appropriate level of quality writing at the undergraduate level.
- Needs at least (2-3) **academic source**. (Book, article, interview, documentary, etc.) Any citation style is ok, as long as it is correct.
- Be submitted as a PDF.
- Submit both video presentation and research paper to Blackboard.

### **Academic Sources**

Academic sources are scholarly books, articles, and research papers that are typically peer-reviewed, credible and authoritative. Peer-reviewed sources are written by an expert in the field and have passed review by other experts who judged the source for quality and accuracy. If a source is peer-reviewed, there's a really good chance it's a good choice for high-quality, accurate information. For these assignments, please avoid using websites like Britannica, Wikipedia, IMDb, etc.

### **Late Work**

- \* Due to the nature of the asynchronous class, instead of week to week assignment deadlines, assignments will be open from the first day of class to the last day of class (prior to study and exam dates). Therefore, anything submitted after the last day of classes will receive a 0.
