# Course Assignments & Topics

The requirements for this course include participating in online discussions and completing all of the assignments. General descriptions of the course requirements are below. See the Canvas modules for detailed assignment instructions.

## Discussion Questions

In order to actively participate in discussions, you will need to log in multiple days each week. This will help you stay up-to-date on the discussions and allow you to make more thoughtful postings. You are expected to answer all of the discussion questions assigned in a week in a substantive manner. All initial postings and responses will be due by 11:59 pm CST by the due date indicated in Canvas. No late posting will be accepted.

## Weekly Assignments

*Note: the full assignment description, due date and instructions for each are found in the Modules section in your online classroom (Canvas). Please pay careful attention to the instructions provided and the rubrics for each assignment.*

### *Identifying Theorist and Theories*

Students will identify main ideas and the key people in each of the following theories, psychoanalytic, behaviorism, structuralism, functionalism, and humanism.

### *Sense Perception*

Students will reflection on their senses and the interpretative process of perception.

### *Maslow and Motivation*

Students will create a PowerPoint presentation on the five levels on need hierarchy identified by Maslow including how one might be prevented from meeting the needs represented by each level.

### *Sternberg's Intelligence Theory Screencast*

Students will create a screencast explaining Sternberg's theory of intelligence and demonstrate understanding how each type of intelligence is measured.

### *Theories of Personality*

Students will complete a personality test and the reflect upon their results using the components of trait, psychoanalytic or humanistic theories.

### *Treatment Techniques*

Students will describe core treatment interventions in psychoanalysis and modern therapies identifying which treatment they would choose and explaining the distinguishing characteristics between the treatment approaches.

### *Stages of Development*

Students will complete a worksheet explaining how they would use their understanding of the major development theories to deal with various lifespan development issues.

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance: According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance. Faculty will provide the Office of Financial Aid with an electronic notification if a student has not attended the first week of class. Any student receiving federal financial aid who does not attend the first week of class will have their aid terminated and returned to the DoE. Please note that any student who stops attending at any time during the semester may also need to return a portion of their federal aid.
