## Course Description

Introduction to the physiological substrates of behavior; including basic neuroanatomy, research techniques, basic physiology, sensory processes and central nervous system functions. Prerequisites: PSYC 2301 and PSYC 2388.

## **Objectives**

- As a result of taking this course, you will be able to:
- Design a teaching tool to explain to the general public how a neuron works, including how neurons communicate and how the brain uses electrical signals
- Make informed decisions about the ethics of animal research, including policy recommendations and educating members of the general public
- Identify ways in which culture and language can influence perception, brain development, and cognition
- Provide a nuanced view of the study of human intelligence, using the current literature on general cognitive ability to take an evidence-based stance while maintaining cultural sensitivity.

#### Late Work

There will be four exams total, covering the most recent materials covered. The fourth exam (final exam) may also contain items that assess overarching themes/important ideas from across the semester. There will be four small projects throughout the semester.

### Time Commitment

You will be tempted to make that time as close to zero as possible. This is a big trap that you \*must\* avoid. Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance: According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance.
