Catalog Description 3301 Accounting for Non-Accounting Majors:

This course approaches accounting from the point of view of a business manager. Emphasis is on both financial and managerial accounting supporting the five functions of management, i.e., planning, organizing, staffing, directing, and controlling, and the publicly available financial statements, using both the balance sheet and income statement. The course culminates in the analysis of publicly available financial statements, using both vertical and horizontal analysis techniques.

This course is specifically designed for non-accounting majors. TSI Restriction(s): Reading, Math, Writing

Course Objectives:

This course is divided into Part A (Financial Accounting) and Part B (Managerial Accounting). After successful completion of this course, students should be able to:

- Understand components of the basic financial statements including income statement, balance sheet, and statement of cash flows.
- Understand double entry (debits and credits) as applicable to balance sheet and income statement.
- Understand character of statements for difference enterprises
- Identify cost allocations such as depreciation.
- Compute break-even and target profit analysis.
- Identify direct material, direct labor, and overhead costs.
- Distinguish between job order and process costings.
- Calculate allocated overhead.
- Identify and calculate variances.
- Identify segment analysis and profitability measures.
- Recognize and identify basic concepts of fixed, variable, and mixed costs.

Examinations:

- The exams will consist of conceptual multiple-choice questions on Blackboard. The
 exam materials will come from lecture notes/power points, and the text. Questions
 will emphasize understanding and applications of concepts and topics covered in the
 course.
- I will provide reviews (with answers) before the mid-term and final exam.
- Midterm exam will be on Part A -Financial Accounting; Final exam will be on Part B (Managerial Accounting)

Homework Assignments:

Course assignments will be completed online using McGraw-Hill Connect. This is why the textbook MUST be purchased as it will give the student a code to access assignments on McGraw Hill Connect

There will be homework assignments on Connect at the end of each chapter. Homework assignments will be posted through Blackboard.

NOTE:

- Since this course is asynchronous, assignments and other required work will be completed within a reasonable time frame. Once Assignments open, they will remain open so students can work on these at their own time.
- However, I would strongly suggest adhering to the <u>suggested</u> due date; however, you MUST complete all assignments BEFORE the mid-term and final exams.
