## **Course Description**

### Summary

In-depth study and applications of polynomial, rational, radical, exponential and logarithmic functions, and systems of equations using matrices. Additional topics such as sequences, series, probability, and conics may be included. This course meets the standards for the Mathematics category of courses under the core curriculum and address the following required objectives: Critical Thinking, Communication, and Empirical Quantitative Skills.

**Prerequisites** MATH 1314 College Algebra with a grade of C or higher.

**Calculators** Basic scientific calculators (non-graphing, non-programmable) are permitted on quizzes and exams. A <u>TI-30XIIS</u> scientific calculator is highly recommended. Cell phones, graphing calculators, and online math utilities are not allowed on quizzes or exams. When appropriate, more advanced calculators and software may be used on homework assignments and during class discussion.

## Student learning outcomes

MATH 2312 helps students develop critical thinking, communication, and empirical and quantitative skills by focusing on student understanding of key mathematical concepts required for calculus readiness to include recognizing, identifying, solving, analyzing and explaining appropriately model applicable real-world situations. Upon completion of this course, students will:

1. Demonstrate understanding and knowledge of properties of functions from graphical, tabular, symbolic, or verbal representations.

- 2. Identify and apply appropriate strategies for solving equations involving algebraic, transcendental, and trigonometric functions.
- 3. Interpret and apply graphing techniques to algebraic and transcendental functions.
- 4. Compute and apply the values of trigonometric functions for key angles in all quadrants of the unit circle measured in both degrees and radians.
- 5. Prove and apply trigonometric identities.
- 6. Interpret and solve applications related to right and oblique triangles.

#### List of topics

Topics to be covered include but are not limited to the following:

- Functions and relations
- Inverse functions
- Exponential and logarithmic functions, and their properties
- Exponential and logarithmic equations with applications
- Angles and their measures
- Trigonometric functions and right triangle trigonometry

- Trigonometric functions of any angle
- Graphs of sine and cosine and other trigonometric functions
- Inverse trigonometric functions
- Trigonometric identities
- Trigonometric equations
- The laws of sines and cosines

The instructor reserves the right to modify/update the topics as appropriate.

#### Midterm Exams (45% total)

There will be three in-class midterm exams during the semester and one final. Your lowest midterm exam score will be replaced by your final exam score if your final exam score is a higher score. In case you miss an exam or find out that you will miss an exam, you should contact me either in person or by e-mail, at least one week in advance of the exam for non-emergency cases or within 24-hrs of the scheduled exam date for emergency cases. Any missed exam counts as a 0 unless the student has a valid documented excuse and contacts me as soon as possible after the excuse for missing the test arises. Examples of valid documented excuses are sickness documented with a doctors

note, death in the family documented with a copy of the death notice, attending university-sponsored events with a Deans excuse, etc. Minor headaches or attending sports events (without Deans excuse) are not examples of emergency situations.

#### Final exam (30%)

In order to pass this class, students must take the final exam scheduled during Finals Week. The exam will cover topics from throughout the semester. Final exams cannot be rescheduled or missed (for dire and unforeseen medical or family emergencies, students must consult with me).

### Quizzes (17%)

Ten short quizzes (10-20 min.) will be given throughout the semester (6 during class and 4 online outside of class). Your top eight scores will count toward your grade. There will be no make-up quizzes.

#### Online homework (8%)

Homework will be assigned regularly with MyMathLab (MML). All due dates are listed in MML. The exercises can be attempted multiple times in order to increase the grade. MyMathLab can be accessed through a link on the Blackboard page or directly at mlm.pearson.com.

Do not wait until the last minute to do your graded homework assignment. If a problem occurs that keeps you from submitting your assignment on time, **no extensions will be given**. It is your responsibility to submit your work on time and make sure it is submitted properly. Your <u>two</u> lowest homework scores will be dropped. These dropped scores are designed to cover situations where you have technical difficulties or any other issue that keeps you from submitting an assignment on time.
