COURSE POLICIES

ATTENDANCE:

This course is offered through hybrid form. We will meet weekly for face-to-face class to enable students to personally experience several different types of online learning activities.

The student is expected to participate all class activities including exams and assignments. It is the responsibility of the student to inform each instructor of absences. When, however, in the judgment of the instructor, a student has been absent to such a degree as to impair his or her status relative to credit for the course, the instructor will recommend the student to drop the course. It is important to understand that class attendance can be used by the instructor as one criterion for grading; **Time spent on Blackboard (can be monitored by a professor).** A student who enrolls for a course and then does not attend is considered absent from class until the student officially drops the course.

- Quizzes and assignments related to weekly topics will be completed inside and/or outside of class. In-class quizzes and assignments missed because of absence will *not* be made up.
- You will have **one unexcused absence without penalty.**
- You will have 2 points deducted for each absence if you do not attend class. You will receive **F on 4th absence (excused or unexcused except for school-sponsored events like athletic programs).**

NETIQUETTE:

15 Essential Netiquette Guidelines to Consider in Online Learning

- Before posting your question to a discussion board, check if anyone has asked it already and received a reply.
- Stay on topic. Don't post irrelevant links, comments, thoughts or pictures.
- Don't type in ALL CAPS! If you do it will look like you are screaming.
- Don't write anything that sounds angry or sarcastic even as a joke, because without hearing your tone of voice, your peers might not realize you're joking.
- Always remember to say "please" and "thank you" when soliciting help from your classmates.
- Respect the opinion of your classmates. If you feel the need to disagree, do so respectfully, and acknowledge the valid points in your classmate's argument. If you reply to a question from a classmate, make sure your answer is accurate!
- If you ask questions, many people respond. Summarize all answers and post that summary to benefit your whole class.
- Be brief. If you write a long dissertation in response to a simple question, it's unlikely that anyone will spend the time to read through it all.
- Don't badmouth others or call them stupid. You may disagree with their ideas but don't mock the person.
- If you refer to something your classmate said earlier in the discussion, quote just a few key lines from their post so that others won't have to go back and figure out which post you're referring to.
- Before asking a question, check the class FAQs or search the Internet to see if the answer is obvious or easy to find.
- Check the most recent comments before you reply to an older comment.
- Be forgiving. If your classmate makes a mistake, don't badger him or her for it. Just let it go.
- Run a spelling and grammar check before posting anything to the discussion board.

<u>Exam format</u>	The tests (exams and quiz) may consist of various forms of questions including multiple choices, true and false, fill in the blank, figure and tables, and short essay questions.
Assignments (Total 40 pts)	Description
Writing (Summary of Journal) (10 pts) due by Nov 4	You will write one single-page summary of peer-reviewed articles given through Blackboard.
Group report (10 pts) due by 17:30 p.m. on Nov 11	Double-space, follow the APA manual, Maximum 10 pages (no minimum pages) including title, a body of text, and references (at least 3 from a valid source like journal and textbook). Students can pick any topic closely related to this class (No approval from the instructor is required)

Group presentation (10 pts) on Nov 18 and Dec 2	Students (4-5) will present the study to the class (20 mins) and answer the questions using a PowerPoint presentation (5 mins).
Participation (10 pts)	You will be awarded up to 10 points based on your performance (attendance, discussion, inquiry, participation, etc)

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance: According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance.
