Catalog Course Description:

This course is an introduction to the fundamental concepts of financial accounting as prescribed by US Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) as applied to transactions and events that affect business organizations. Students will examine the procedures and systems to accumulate, analyze, measure, and record financial transactions.

Course Objectives:

- To gain factual knowledge. You will gain an understanding of financial terminology used in business, business transaction analysis, and the classification of accounts, all for the purpose of learning to read and comprehend business financial statements.
- To learn to apply course material learned. You will improve your thinking, problem solving and decision-making skills.
- To learn how to find and use resources for answering questions or solving problems. You will develop the ability to use business financial information as a resource for making rational business decisions.

Prerequisites: None**Student Learning Outcomes:**

After successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1) Understand the difference between cash and accrual accounting
- 2). Understand the basic Accounting Equation
- 3). Understand and formulate the four key financial statements.
- 4). Understand the key components of the financial statements, i.e., revenue, expenses, assets & liabilities.
- 5) Understand how these statements are derived and the relationship between them
- 6) Learn to write journal entries, T Accounts and debits and credits to record and analyze transactions

AACSB Assessment:

Required Materials:

- **Textbook: Financial Accounting, 6ed Spiceland/Thomas/Herrmann – McGraw Hill.** You **MUST** have the code to access Assignments on McGraw Hill Connect.
- **Calculator:** A **simple** calculator is required – please do not use the calculator on your cell phone. You can purchase this from Target, Walmart, or Office Depot for less than \$10.
- **Blackboard:** Connect to <http://tamusa.blackboard.com>. You will have lecture notes/ power points, solutions to problems, and other supplementary materials on Blackboard. It may also be used for communication, announcements, assignments, and exams. **All class communications and especially announcements will be through Blackboard and students should monitor this several times a day.**
- **Connect:** All assignments will be on an online homework management system. McGraw Hill uses **Connect**. Instructions on how to obtain online access and a link to the website will be provided separately. Please ensure that you have purchased the book with the access code and register in the system ASAP. Connect gives you a **2 week grace period** after which you **MUST** purchase the textbook + code if you decide to stay in this course
- **Software:** You may be required to use Microsoft Excel and Microsoft Word. These products are available in the computer labs on campus. You will also be able to download the installation software from the Microsoft software center.
- **Computer Hardware:** Please ensure that you have a computer/laptop with a good internet connection. To complete the class work, you will need appropriate software installed on the computer.
- **Time Expectation for course work:** You are expected to spend 4-8 hours per week for the course. Based on the background, some students may require more time. Time spent may be longer when assignment/exams are due. Please **DO NOT PROCRASTINATE!!!**

Course Requirements every student must fulfill to succeed in course:

Examinations

A midterm exam - The exam will consist of conceptual multiple-choice questions. The exam materials will come from lecture notes, in class problems, power points and the text. I will do a review before the mid-term exam which will be posted on Blackboard.

The final exam will also be multiple choice questions. There will be a review before Exam.

You will be given 1 day to complete both exams. Please ensure that all applicable chapter assignments are complete BEFORE the exams.

For any questions about the exams and assignments, a student should contact the instructor well in advance of the day they are due, so the instructor may have enough time to provide feedback.

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance:

According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. The Six-Drop Rule:

A non-punitive drop does not affect the student's GPA. However, course drops that exceed the maximum allowed by SB 1231 will be treated as "F" grades and will impact the student's GPA.
