COURSE DESCRIPTION

Catalog Description 3301 Accounting for Non-Accounting Majors:

This course approaches accounting from the point of view of a business manager. Emphasis is on the source, strengths, and limitations of financial accounting information as a support for the five functions of management, i.e., planning, organizing, staffing, directing, and controlling. The course culminates in the analysis of publicly available financial statements, using both vertical and horizontal analysis techniques. This course is specifically designed for non-accounting majors. TSI Restriction(s): Reading, Math, Writing

Prerequisites: ACCT 2301 and ACCT 2302 or equivalent. Restrictions: Students cannot enroll who have a major in accounting. Graduate level students may not enroll.

AACSB Assessment:

The College of Business is in the process of applying for AACSB accreditation. As part of that process, students will be assessed on program level outcomes based on course outcomes from various courses. The materials from this course may be used for assessing such program level outcomes, and hence students must follow the necessary rigor to ensure mastery and retention of the above course outcomes.

Course Objectives

This course will be divided into **Part A (Financial Accounting)** and **Part B (Managerial Accounting)**. After successful completion of this course, students should be able to:

- Understand components of the basic financial statements including income statement, balance sheet, and statement of cash flows.
- Understand the character of statements for different enterprises.
- Identify cost allocations such as depreciation.
- Compute break even and target profit analysis.
- Identify direct material, direct labor, and overhead costs.
- Distinguish between job order and process costing.
- · Calculate allocated overhead.
- Identify and calculate variances.
- Identify segment analysis and profitability measures.
- Recognize and identify basic concepts of fixed, variable, and mixed costs.

Examinations:

There will be a mandatory mid-term exam and a mandatory cumulative final exam (as per university schedule). Non-submission of an exam will result in a grade of zero for that exam and may result in a failure grade in the course. The exams will consist of conceptual multiple-choice questions on Blackboard. The exam materials will come from lecture notes/power points, and the text. Questions will emphasize understanding and applications of concepts and topics covered in the course. I will do a review before the mid-term and final exam.

You will be given 1 day to complete both exams. Please ensure that all applicable chapter assignments are complete BEFORE the exams.

Homework Assignments:

There will be homework assignments on Connect at the end of each chapter. Homework assignments and *expected* due dates will be posted through Blackboard.
