Catalog Course Description: This course introduces the nature and structure of the US and Texas legal systems; the basic principles of legal reasoning; and laws having a substantial impact on business including contracts, business organizations, and the Uniform Commercial Code.

Prerequisites: ENGL 1301 & ENGL 1302

Student Learning Outcomes: Upon completion of this course, you should be able to:

- Understand Business Entities including the advantages and disadvantages of each.
- Identify the difference between Intentional Torts and Negligence.
- Analyze if a valid, enforceable Contract exists.
- Evaluate case problems using Legal Reasoning.

Grading Policy:

- **12 Application-Based Activities (ABAs):** Most weeks, students will complete an ABA through McGraw Hill Connect. ABAs will be due at 5:00pm on the Fridays (or Thursday) noted on the schedule below. You will have two attempts to complete each ABA and you will receive the highest score of your two attempts. Late submissions will be accepted for five additional days (i.e. until the following Wednesday). To be able to complete a simulation after the due date, you must email the professor to be granted access. ABAs completed in accordance with the late policy will receive half credit. If you begin the ABA before the deadline, but then submit it after the deadline, you must email the professor to receive credit. Your lowest ABA grade will be dropped. The average of your ABAs will be 25% of your course grade.
- **3 Exams:** This course will have three exams (including a comprehensive Final Exam). Exams will consist of case problem style questions. Exams will be completed in class. Exams 1 & 2 will be 20% of your course grade and the Final will be 25%.
- **Attendance:** Attendance is required. Attendance will be 10% of your course grade. To be counted as present, you must attend the vast entirety of the class session. Arriving late, leaving early, or disappearing during class may impact your grade. Your attendance grade will be the percentage of classes you attended. This means that each class you miss lowers your attendance grade by about 3.57 points. However, there is no penalty for your first two absences. If you must miss additional classes for medical reasons or if you require an accommodation, please provide documentation through the Dean of Students office or Disability Support Services. This is no penalty for absences excused by the University.
- **Extra Credit:** There is NO extra credit available in this course.
- **Academic Dishonesty:** Any assignment found to contain plagiarized material or be the result of any academic dishonesty will receive the grade of zero. In addition, two instances of academic dishonesty will result in the grade of F being assigned for the course.

Definition Of a Credit Hour: “A credit hour is an amount of work that reasonably approximates: not less than one hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours out of class student work each week for approximately 15 weeks for one semester, or the equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time; at least an equivalent amount of work as outlined in the item above for other academic activities as established by the institution including laboratory work, internships, practicum, studio work, and other academic work leading to the award of credit hours. (This information is in accord with federal regulations regarding the definition and assignment of credit hours under section 600.0 and 600.24(f) of the Higher Education Opportunity Act.)

“A credit hour represents a unit of measure of instruction consisting of 60 minutes, of which 50 minutes must be direct instruction over a 15-week period in a semester system. Academic administrative units are responsible for ensuring that credit hours are awarded only for work that meets this requirement. (This is in accord with The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board definition.) Transfer credits will be evaluating for equivalency to this requirement. 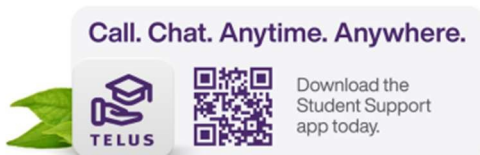

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance: According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance. Faculty will provide the Office of Financial Aid with an electronic notification if a student has not attended by the published Census Date (the first week of class). Any student receiving federal financial aid who does not attend prior to the published Census Date (the first week of class) will have their aid terminated and returned to the DoE. Please note that any student who stops attending at any time during the semester may also need to return a portion of their federal aid.

Writing, Language, and Digital Composing Center: The Writing, Language, and Digital Composing Center supports graduate and undergraduate students in all three colleges as well as faculty and staff. A non-punitive drop does not affect the student's GPA. However, course drops that exceed the maximum allowed by SB 1231 will be treated as "F" grades and will impact the student's GPA.

Students' Rights and Responsibilities: The following statement of students' rights and responsibilities is intended to reflect the philosophical base upon which University Student Rules are built. This philosophy acknowledges the existence of both rights and responsibilities, which is inherent to an individual not only as a student at Texas A&M University-San Antonio but also as a citizen of this country.

Students' Rights

1. A student shall have the right to participate in a free exchange of ideas, and there shall be no University rule or administrative rule that in any way abridges the rights of freedom of speech, expression, petition and peaceful assembly as set forth in the U.S. Constitution.
2. Each student shall have the right to participate in all areas and activities of the University, free from any form of discrimination, including harassment, on the basis of race, color, national or ethnic origin, religion, sex, disability, age, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, and pregnancy/parenting or veteran status in accordance with applicable federal and state laws.
3. A student has the right to personal privacy except as otherwise provided by law, and this will be observed by students and University authorities alike.
4. Each student subject to disciplinary action arising from violations of university students' rules shall be assured a fundamentally fair process.

Students' Responsibilities

1. A student has the responsibility to respect the rights and property of others, including other students, the faculty, and administration.
2. A student has the responsibility to be fully acquainted with the published University Student Rules found in the Student Handbook, Student Code of Conduct, on our website, and University Catalog, and to comply with them, as well as with federal, state, and local laws.
3. A student has the responsibility to recognize that student actions reflect upon the individuals involved and upon the entire University community.
4. A student has the responsibility to recognize the University's obligation to provide a safe environment for learning.
5. A student has the responsibility to check their university email for any updates or official university notifications.
