Catalog Course Description: This course introduces economic systems, forms of business ownership, and considerations for running a business. Students will learn various aspects of business, management, and leadership functions; organizational considerations; and decision-making processes. Financial topics are introduced including money and banking and securities markets. The course includes discussions of business challenges in the legal and regulatory environment, business ethics, social responsibility, and international business. Emphasized is the dynamic role of business in everyday life.



Student Learning Outcomes: Upon completion of this course, you should be able to:

- Identify the historical basis for and sources of American law, classify the types of law and outline key elements of the U.S. Constitution.
- Outline the structure of federal and state court systems, describe the steps in litigation and explain the main forms of alternate dispute resolution.
- Define and explain the basic elements of a contract, apply them to specific cases and explain contract defenses.
- Determine when a contract is breached and select the appropriate remedy for breach.
- Explain the difference between intentional torts, negligence and strict liability, and the applicable defenses and the remedies available for each.
- Describe the purpose of criminal law, identify the elements of certain specific crimes, choose among available defenses and apply punishment for criminal violations.
- Explain the difference between real and personal property, describe the means of ownership and outline basic principles of bailment.
- Outline basic agency and employment law principles, explain the role of the independent contractor and describe basic labor laws.
- Provide the key elements of sole proprietorships, partnerships and corporations, and explain the advantages and disadvantages of each.
- Classify and explain the types of intellectual property and identify cyber-crime issues.

Exams: There are 4 <u>objective style exams (multiple choice) available on Blackboard</u> that will cover the assigned readings. Exams will be due at 11:59 PM CST by Saturday noted on the schedule below. Each exam is multiple choice test, based on the readings. You have 70 minutes to complete the exam. Note that when you log on you cannot leave and re-enter the test. You must complete the test once you begin. You have 50 multiple choice questions to answer for 70 minutes.

Discussion Boards: There are 11 discussion topics assigned on Blackboard (the lowest score will be dropped) that are available on Monday and end on Saturday 12 NOON CST. You must submit your main response by Wednesday and respond "at a minimum" to two others in class on two separate days. Your responses must be substantial contributions to the assignment, supported by sources (statutes, cases, articles). Use the university online library system to locate scholarly sources.

The College of Business has scheduled a series of activities designed to enrich your undergraduate learning experience. A detailed schedule of the activities, including dates and times, will be provided.

Participation in one activity is a **mandatory** component of this course and contributes to 10% of your overall grade.

Failure to meet the participation requirement without documentation may result in a reduction of your grade for the course. Please contact your instructor immediately if you anticipate challenges with fulfilling this requirement so accommodations can be discussed.

Attendance: Attendance is required. To be counted as present, you must attend the entirety of the class session. Arriving late or leaving early will count as a ½ absence. Attendance will be 10% of your course grade. Your attendance grade will be the percentage of classes you attended. This means that each class you miss lowers your attendance grade by about 3.57 points. If you must miss multiple classes for medical reasons or if you require accommodations, please provide

documentation through the Dean of Students office or Disability Support Services. If you miss more than 6 classes each additional absence will deduct one point from your course grade.

Extra Credit: This is NO extra credit available in this course. [Not even if you email me at the end of the semester asking.

Academic Dishonesty: Any assignment found to contain plagiarized material or be the result of any academic dishonesty will receive the grade of zero. In addition, two instances of academic dishonesty will result in the grade of F being assigned for the course.

In all academic work, the ideas and contributions of others must be appropriately acknowledged and work that is presented as original must be, in fact, original. Using an AI-content generator (such as ChatGPT) to complete coursework without proper attribution or authorization is a form of academic dishonesty. If you are unsure about whether something may be plagiarism or academic dishonesty, please contact your instructor to discuss the issue.

Make up and Late Assignment/Exam Policy:

Exams & Discussion Boards: There will be no make-up exams or discussion boards, and no late exams or discussion boards will be accepted.

Exams: You must provide me with prior notice if you miss the final exam in a non-emergency situation. Failure to do this will result in a 20-point reduction in your exam grade. Any makeup exams should be taken within one week of the scheduled exam date.

Definition Of a Credit Hour:

"A credit hour is an amount of work that reasonably approximates: not less than one hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours out of class student work each week for approximately 15 weeks for one semester, or the equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time; at least an equivalent amount of work as outlined in the item above for other academic activities as established by the institution including laboratory work, internships, practicum, studio work, and other academic work leading to the award of credit hours. (This information is in accord with federal regulations regarding the definition and assignment of credit hours under section 600.0 and 600.24(f) of the Higher Education Opportunity Act.)

"A credit hour represents a unit of measure of instruction consisting of 60 minutes, of which 50 minutes must be direct instruction over a 15-week period in a semester system. Academic administrative units are responsible for ensuring that credit hours are awarded only for work that meets this requirement. (This is in accord with The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board definition.) Transfer credits will be evaluating for equivalency to this requirement. Therefore, this course requires 3 hours of class time plus a minimum of 6 hours of homework per week.

<u>Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance</u>: According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance.
