Catalog Course Description: The focus of the course is the study of statistical methods and management science approach to improve the decision-making process. Tools used for framing problems and performing logical analyses for decision-analytic modeling in Excel will be introduced. Specific subjects such as probability distribution, decision trees, linear programming, and sensitivity analysis will be covered throughout the semester.

Prerequisites: Admission to the 11-month MBA program.

Course Objectives: The objective of the course is to improve student's understanding of quantitative reasoning ability and provide them with knowledge of the coherent approach to decision-making process.

Student Learning Outcomes: Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

1. Understand the strategic importance and influence of business decision-making process.
2. Understand the principle of statistical analysis.
3. Understand how to apply the statistical model and use the various applications to solve the problem.
4. Acquire and sharpen critical thinking about business decision-making by analyzing the sensitivity analysis.

AACSB Assessment:

The College of Business is in the process of applying for AACSB accreditation. As part of that process, students will be assessed on program level outcomes based on course outcomes from various courses. The materials from this course may be used for assessing such program level outcomes, and hence students must follow the necessary rigor to ensure mastery and retention of the above course outcomes.

Grading Policy: The final course grade will be based on your performance on the quizzes, exams and class attendance using the following weights:

Attendance, Participation	20%

The final letter grades will be assigned as follows: Above 90% $\Rightarrow$ A; 80-89.99% $\Rightarrow$ B; 70-79.99% $\Rightarrow$ C; 60-69.99% $\Rightarrow$ D; Below 60% $\Rightarrow$ F. This course has a requirement of a grade of C as a minimal grade for satisfactory completion of this course.

The instructor reserves the right to adjust the student's final grade based on the overall performance.

Attendance: Attendance is required. Roll will be taken at least twice during each class, once at the beginning and once at the end. Students who leave before the class ends will not receive attendance credit. Any instance of proxy attendance (signing in for someone else or having someone else sign in for you) will be considered misconduct, and both students involved will receive zero attendance credit. Class absences will be excused only under very special circumstances. Students are responsible for making up any missed work and for obtaining the assignment from the missed class.

Participation: Everyone enrolled in this 5-week class is expected to follow all rules of common courtesy during classroom lectures and discussions in class. Classroom participation includes asking a question, participating in class discussion and problem solving, and paying attention to the lecture. Participation points will be deducted when a disruptive activity (i.e., sleeping, calling out, side-talking, using digital devices which are not related to the class lecture, email asking for the class announcements, etc.) occurred.

Quizzes: There will be 4 quizzes at the beginning or the end of the class throughout the semester. Makeup quizzes will not be allowed. These will be open notes but must be completed independently.

Final exam: There will be a mandatory final exam. The exams will consist of multiple-choice questions, problem-solving questions. The exam materials will come from lecture notes, and class discussions. Questions will emphasize understanding and applications of concepts and topics covered in class. No make-up or late submissions will be offered/accepted.

Course Requirements every student must fulfill in order to succeed in course:

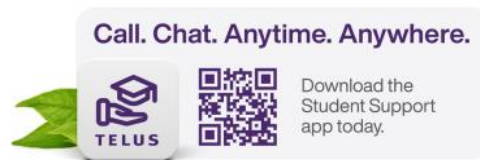

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance: According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance.
