Course Objectives:

Examines marketing in other countries, the marketing implications of cultural and environmental differences, international marketing research and adaptation of product, price, promotion and distribution decisions to international environments. Topics include international trade theory and the multinational firm. Prerequisites: MKTG 3311

Student Learning Outcomes:

After successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Explain how cultural differences among target countries can affect the development and implementation of global and international marketing strategies.
- 2. Explain and illustrate the advantages and disadvantages of different market entry strategies for firms pursuing a presence in foreign countries.
- 3. Describe the impact of country specific factors, such as the political, legal, regulatory, economic, competitive and technological factors have on the development of marketing strategies.

- 4. Understand the process of formulating international marketing strategies.
- 5. Overcome the barrier of lack of knowledge of world markets.

• Smartbook exercises help students identify areas of mastery and areas of improvement related to each chapter readings.

- There is one SmartBook per chapter. Several types of questions exist, for example: fill in the blank, rank order, multiple choice questions, etc. Time to complete the assignment will vary.
- Read each question and make the appropriate decision to answer the questions.

Connect Chapter Quizzes:

Purpose: (why are we doing this?)

• Understanding and using key marketing concepts is fundamental to student and professional success.

Task: (what do we need to do?)

- Students will complete chapter quizzes consisting of multiple-choice and true and false questions related to understanding key terms.
- Students are responsible for completing quizzes outside the class. Students have 25 minutes to complete 20 questions. Once the time is up, the quiz will auto-submit.
- All quizzes use Proctorio; students must use Google Chrome on a desktop or laptop to complete the exams. Please click here for a student orientation video on Proctorio.

Exams:

Purpose: (why are we doing this?)

 This is done to ensure that students can store and recall marketing knowledge on demand.

Task: (what do we need to do?)

- Students will complete a midterm and a final exam each consisting of multiple-choice, true and false, and open-ended questions.
- Students must bring a Scantron and pencils to complete the exam in class.

Criteria: (how do we know if we've been successful)

• A grade will be assessed for each exam.

Class Attendance:

Purpose: (why are we doing this?)

• Regular attendance is a signal of one's commitment to the task.

Task: (what do we need to do?)

• This is the easy part, show up before the class begins and do not leave until the class ends.

Criteria: (how do we know if we've been successful)

- Although I appreciate notification of a class absence, understand that telling the
 professor that you will be absent does not necessarily mean that your absence does not
 "count." Having tests, projects, papers, etc., in other classes is not a valid reason for
 class absence.
- Students are allowed two excused absences during the semester for any reason (e.g., sickness, family emergencies, weddings, oversleeping, car trouble, job interviews, etc.) with no questions asked.
- Beginning with the third absence, 10 points will be deducted for each additional absence. The only exceptions to this policy are students who may be participating in sports or academic competitions recognized by the university and only for the day(s) of competition.
- You need to be in class on time, students can have one tardy that does not impact their grade, each tardy after the first will reduce attendance grade by 2 points.

 Students will be marked tardy if they leave early from class without informing the professor prior to class starting.

Application Video Reflection:

Purpose: (why are we doing this?)

• Students will participate in an in-class application that aims to bring to life a critical concept of culture in the class.

Task: (what do we need to do?)

- Participate in the in-class activity.
- Each student must record a 2–3-minute video reflecting on each simulation.
- Submit videos by recording them and then using the paper clip icon on the submission link to upload the videos.

Criteria: (how do we know if we've been successful)

- The video must include the student talking on camera and must show their face.
- Students should reflect on the application. Some talking points could be the following.

 1) what the application was about, 2) what they learned after the application, 3) how and why the lessons learned can help them in their careers.

In the News Presentation/PowerPoint

Purpose: (why are we doing this?)

• Help you work with a group and gain and understanding of how companies are conducting International Marketing by searching real-world news stories.

Task: (what do we need to do?)

- To complete this assignment, students must be part of a group of a max of three students.
- Each group must find three recent, no more than five-years-old, marketing news story.
- Students can find these articles in outlets such as Fortune, Fast Company, INC, Wired, Entrepreneur, and other similar news outlets.
- After finding the news articles, students must create a PowerPoint and address the following issues below in a presentation that does not exceed 10 minutes.
 - 1) Students must summarize the article.
 - o 2) Students must tie the news story into the class concepts and theories.
 - 3) Students must provide a detailed personal reaction on how this information impacts them as a future manager.
 - 4) Students must provide a detailed personal reaction on how this information impacts them as a consumer.
 - 5) Students must create a PowerPoint and present it during their recording.

Criteria: (how do we know if we've been successful)

- This is an individual grade.
- When presenting, students should pay attention to their delivery during the presentation and must integrate the key terms from the book into the presentation.

• Points will be deducted if you use any additional written notes besides the presentation.

Group Guidelines:

Others must pick up the slack when someone drops the ball in a group project. However, when extreme problems with a group member arise, the other students should let me know promptly so that the students may inform the student that they will be dropped from the group. The student who was dropped is still expected to complete all the requirements for the class. All team members will receive one grade for group assignments and each student must submit their documents.

Late Work Policy:

All work will be open from the first day of class, so you are welcome to get ahead of the outlined schedule below. If for some reason you miss a deadline, the specifics for each assignment are outlined below. Just as in life, sometimes you get second chances, and sometimes you don't, and the same goes for this class as you will see below. Exceptions may be made for students participating official university activity. However, students must provide comprehensive documentation and inform the professor via email before the due date for the missed assignment.
