COURSE DESCRIPTION: A general survey of music literature designed for the non-music major. Representative composers and their works are studied through recordings, lectures, reports, and performances. The course focuses on the appreciation and analysis of musical compositions and performances, synthesis and interpretation of artistic expression and critical, creative, and innovative communication about works of art. This course meets the standards for the Creative Arts category of courses under the core curriculum.

COURSE GOALS:

- To gain a broader understanding and subsequent appreciation for different types of music from different eras and locations around the globe.
- To gain and demonstrate music literacy through hands-on activities of music making.
- To develop a more comprehensive vocabulary with which to communicate ideas and opinions about music.

ADDITIONAL CORE CURRICULUM GOALS:

The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB) requires a core curriculum for all undergraduate students at public higher education institutions in Texas. The purpose is to develop essential knowledge and skills to be successful in college, in a career, in communities, and in life.
