COURSE DESCRIPTION

Sociology is a large and diverse discipline with a body of knowledge that provides theoretical, analytical, methodological, and empirical tools for understanding the social world. It is the study of human interaction, groups, societies, and institutions. Sociologists ask questions like: to what extent and how are our everyday lives guided by organizations and institutions (i.e. religion, family, education, politics, media, and the economy)? In turn, how do we shape these institutions? How do we make sense of our lives, understand our feelings and beliefs, and make certain choices given a particular cultural and political context? Sociology offers frameworks for understanding the most far-reaching and global social phenomena while at the same time allowing you to understand how you, as an individual, act, react and interact with society.

Exam 1 will be comprised of questions stemming from Chapters 1-5. Exam 2 will be comprised of questions stemming from Chapters 11, 12 and 14 -16. There will NOT be a cumulative final exam.

Photography Midterm (Application and Critical Thinking skills)

There is only one midterm. It will require you to take photos and interpret them using sociological concepts and ideas discussed in this classs.

You will apply a sociological perspective to interpret human interactions, relationships, patterns, and agency

- Develop an awareness of the social processes that influence the way humans think, feel, and behave
- · Show the relevance and reality of structural factors in social life
- · Place social phenomenon in larger context and identify social patterns
- Think critically about individualistic explanations of human behavior

Essays (Analytic & Communication Skills)

There are a total of four essays. Your submission will be via Blackboard located in Exams & Quizzes tab. The writing responses will be a minimum of 200 words per question, you must also respond to another student, and the essays are due by Sunday of the week they are assigned at 11:59 p.m. The purpose of these writing exercises is to get you using your own words to describe how you understand sociology. You must use concepts and ideas from our textbook to receive credit for both the essay and on your comment to your classmate. I will provide some specific feedback, but mostly collective feedback for class via Face-to-Face discussion. Only use Microsoft Word or PDF for Weekly Analytic Prompt submissions. Quizzes (Comprehension and Understanding Skills)

These quizzes are designed to help you understand concepts, ideas, and theories. There will be seven quizzes worth 10 points each. They will open the Monday morning (12:00 am) of the week they are assigned on the syllabus and be due the following Sunday by 11:59 pm.
