Course Description: Most of the course will be spent on-site working at an internship location. A seminar-style Ethics course will be held during our internship meeting on Tuesdays. (See official description in catalog.)

Course Objectives

Students will learn applied concepts in psychology that are directly applied to working in the field. Students will also learn about appropriate work behavior and study ethical issues in psychology that could present themselves while working in the field.

Assessment of Student Learner Outcomes

Students will present an ethics lesson throughout the semester. They will also be evaluated by the on-site supervisor of the internship.

Course Mechanics

We will meet once weekly for 1 hours and 15 minutes. I expect punctuality. If you have to miss a class for any reason, please let me know by email as soon as you know you'll be absent. Unexplained absences will reduce your grade. **Because we only meet for 11 lecture days, three absences will potentially cost a letter grade.** Only rare exceptions will be made (for example, illness, with relevant documentation). I also expect participation. Lack of contribution to class discussion will also impact your grade.

Requirements:

1. *Attendance:*
Students will attend their internships for 110 Hours a semester.
Students must attend Internship class every class period
2. *Participation:*
Students will keep a journal of internship activities. Please keep confidential information out of the journal; be very general. This journal may be shared with others who are considering that internship.
Students will dress appropriately for their internships.
Students will address people appropriately (those with a Ph.D. should be called “Dr. so and so”, not Mrs, Miss, etc.). If you are not sure, please inquire. Do not call supervisors and others in positions of authority by first names unless specifically invited to by those individuals.
Students will remember that they are representatives of the university. When referring to the university, students should use appropriate abbreviations when both speaking and writing.

3. *Evaluation:*
Students will lead a seminar for the class that includes two vignettes (or articles)
Students will participate in the discussions led by instructor and by fellow students
Students will be evaluated by the on-site internship supervisor.
Students will be evaluated on participation and attendance requirements.
4. *Poster:*
Students will create a poster that might be used for the internship showcase in the spring. If we have opportunity in the fall, we may have new potential internship students come to one of our classes and look at posters online. Only one poster per site is needed; Example is found in Blackboard.

Course Grades

Each student's grade will be based solely on his/her performance. Students will not compete against one another for grades (i.e., the instructor will not limit the number of As, Bs, etc.). An individual's course grade is based on his or her raw score points (i.e., the total number of points earned during the semester). For example, using the table below, a student who earns 850 points during the semester will earn a "B." A student who has a total of 642 points at the end of the semester will earn a "D" in the course.

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance: According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance. Faculty will provide the Office of Financial Aid with an electronic notification if a student has not attended the first week of class. Any student receiving federal financial aid who does not attend the first week of class will have their aid terminated and returned to the DoE. Please note that any student who stops attending at any time during the semester may also need to return a portion of their federal aid.

Writing, Language, and Digital Composing Center: The Writing, Language, and Digital Composing Center supports graduate and undergraduate students in all three colleges as well as faculty and staff. Tutors work with students to develop reading skills, prepare oral presentations, and plan, draft, and revise their written assignments. The Six-Drop Rule: Students are subject to the requirements of Senate Bill (SB) 1231 passed by the Texas Legislature in 2007. SB 1231 limits students to a maximum of six (6) non-punitive course drops (i.e., courses a student chooses to drop) during their undergraduate careers. A non-punitive drop does not affect the student's GPA. However, course drops that exceed the maximum allowed by SB 1231 will be treated as "F" grades and will impact the student's GPA.

Pregnant/Parenting Students: Texas A&M-San Antonio does not require a pregnant or parenting student, solely because of that status or issues related to that status, to (1) take a leave of absence or withdraw from their degree or certificate program; (2) limit the student's studies; (3) participate in an alternative program; (4) change the student's major, degree, or certificate program; or (5) refrain from joining or cease participating in any course, activity, or program at the University. The university will provide reasonable accommodations to pregnant students that would be provided to a student with a temporary medical condition and that are related to
