#### **Course Description and Materials**

**Course Overview**: In-depth study and applications of polynomial, rational, radical, exponential and logarithmic functions, and systems of equations using matrices. Additional topics such as sequences, series, probability, and conics may be included. This course meets the standards for the Mathematics category of courses under the core curriculum. **Prerequisites**: Evidence of math equivalent to High School Algebra II ("C" or higher) or placement

**Calculators:** Basic scientific calculators (non-graphing, non-programmable) are permitted on quizzes and exams. A TI-30XIIS scientific calculator is highly recommended. Cell phones, graphing calculators, and online math utilities are not allowed on quizzes or exams. When appropriate, more advanced calculators and software may be used on homework assignments and during class discussion.

#### **Student Learner Objectives**

Upon completion of this course, students will:

- 1. Demonstrate understanding and knowledge of properties of functions, including domain and range, operations, compositions, and inverses.
- 2. Recognize and apply polynomial, rational, radical, exponential, and logarithmic functions, and solve and explain related equations.
- 3. Interpret and apply graphing techniques.
- 4. Evaluate all roots of higher degree polynomial and rational functions.
- 5. Recognize, solve, apply and explain systems of linear equations using matrices

MATH 1314 helps students develop critical thinking, communication, and empirical and quantitative skills by focusing on student understanding of key algebraic concepts and appropriate applications related to everyday experience.

## **Grading Policy**

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**Homework:** Homework will be assigned regularly with MyLab. All due dates are listed in MyLab. The exercises can be attempted multiple times in order to increase the grade. MyLab can be accessed through a link on the Blackboard page or directly at mlm.pearson.com. Students are also encouraged to practice writing solutions and will be responsible for knowing how to write clear, justified solutions on guizzes and exams.

**Quizzes/Other Assignments:** Quizzes will be given weekly on Wednesdays (except on exam days), beginning the second week of class. There will be no make-up quizzes. Additionally, written assignments may be assigned as homework or classwork. These assignments are due when announced. There will be no make-ups for missed assignments/classwork, but 2 scores from the Quizzes/Other Assignments category will be dropped.

**Midterm Exams:** There will be three in-class exams during the semester. The tentative dates are September 24, October 22, and November 19. In case you miss an exam or find out that you will miss an exam, you should

contact me either in person or by e-mail, at least one week in advance of the exam for non-emergency cases or within 24-hrs of the scheduled exam date for emergency cases. Any missed exam counts as a 0 unless the student has a valid documented excuse and contacts me as soon as possible after the excuse for missing the test arises. Examples of valid documented excuses are sickness documented with a doctor's note, death in the family documented with a copy of the death notice, attending university-sponsored events with a Dean's excuse, etc. Minor headaches or attending sports events (without Dean's excuse) are not examples of emergency situations.

**Final Exam:** In order to pass this class, students  $\underline{\text{must}}$  take the final exam on December 8, 10:00 am – 11:50 am. The exam will cover topics from throughout the semester. Final exams cannot be rescheduled or missed (for dire and unforeseen medical or family emergencies, students must consult with me).

#### **Class Policies and Expectations**

- Students are expected to arrive and be ready to start class on time and stay for the entire class period.

- 2. Students are expected to participate in discussions, in-class exercises, quizzes and problem presentations. During lectures, class discussions, or group discussions, students should give their attention to the speaker(s) and contribute to the conversation. Students can earn up to 5 points (added to exam scores) based on their level of participation.
