Course Description

Study of the structure and function of human anatomy, including the cardiovascular system, lymphatic system, respiratory system, endocrine system, digestive system, metabolism, urinary system, and reproductive system. With laboratory section. This course meets the standards for the Life and Physical Sciences category of courses under the core curriculum.

Learning Outcomes

Course Description and Learning Outcomes as per the Academic Course Guide Manual of The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB): Anatomy and Physiology II is the second part of a two-course sequence. It is a study of the structure and function of the human body including the following systems: endocrine, cardiovascular (heart, blood and vessels), immune, lymphatic, respiratory, digestive (including nutrition), urinary (including fluid and electrolyte balance), and reproductive (including human development and genetics). Emphasis is on interrelationships among systems and regulation of physiological functions involved in maintaining homeostasis.

They are:

- Communication – expressing ideas through effective written, oral, and visual communication.
- Teamwork – considering different points of view and working effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal.
- Critical Thinking – exploring issues, ideas, artifacts, and events before accepting or

formulating an opinion or conclusion.

- Empirical and Quantitative Skills – Applying scientific and mathematical concepts to analyze and solve problems.

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- Use anatomical terminology to identify and describe locations of major organs of each system covered.
- Explain interrelationships between molecular, cellular, tissue, and organ functions in each system.
- Describe the interdependency and interactions of the systems.
- Explain contributions of organs and systems to the maintenance of homeostasis.
- Identify causes and effects of homeostatic imbalances.
- Describe modern technology and tools used to study anatomy and physiology.

Attendance. Students must attend lecture and lab in person. In lecture, student attendance counts as a lecture exam grade. In lab, **you cannot miss more than three in person labs**, or your lab grade will not be higher than 50%.

- Laboratory assignments need to be electronically submitted to McGraw-Hill or through BlackBoard. It is important that students remain cognizant of McGraw-Hill work through the McGraw-Hill website. Remember, **LATE** electronic submissions are accepted with a possible point deduction.

Process for Drops or Withdrawals:

- Prior to the Census Date (noted in the schedule): Faculty will process drops for students who never attended in person since the first day of class.
- Participation – students who do not consistently attend in person class may be dropped.
 - Leading up to the Census Date students must submit all assignments as outlined in the schedule in addition to meeting the attendance policy.
 - After the Census Date, in addition to meeting the attendance policy, students must be earning at least a 65 or higher (in both lecture and lab), earning a project average of 70 or better as well as have taken all lecture exams scheduled up to that point.

Instructor Response Time: One week is required to complete grading on some assignments. In some cases, it may be longer, depending on the nature of the assignment. However, students will always be alerted of any delays.

- If the student emails, please allow at least 24 – 48 hours for the instructor to respond.

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance

According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. The Six-Drop Rule

A non-punitive drop does not affect the student's GPA. However, course drops that exceed the maximum allowed by SB 1231 will be treated as "F" grades and will impact the student's GPA.

Artificial Intelligence Policy

This assumes that all work submitted by students will be generated by the students themselves, working individually or in groups. Option 2: Use of Generative AI Permitted Under Some Circumstances or With Explicit Permission

There are situations and contexts within this course where you may be asked to use artificial intelligence (AI) tools to explore how they can be used. Outside of those circumstances, you should not use AI tools to generate content (text, video, audio, images) that will end up in any student work (assignments, activities, discussion responses, etc.) that is part of your evaluation in this course. Any student work submitted using AI tools should clearly indicate with attribution what work is the student's work and what part is generated by the AI. In such cases, no more than 25% of the student work should be generated by AI. If any part of this is confusing or uncertain, students should reach out to their instructor for clarification before submitting work for grading. Use of AI-generated content without the instructor's permission and/or proper attribution in this course qualifies as academic dishonesty and violates Texas A&M-San Antonio's standards of academic integrity.

Option 3: Broader Use of Generative AI Permitted Within Guidelines

Use of artificial intelligence (AI) tools, including ChatGPT, is permitted in this course for students who wish to use them. To adhere to our scholarly values, students must cite any AI-generated material that informed them of their work (this includes in-text citations and/or use of quotations, and in your reference list). Using an AI tool to generate content without proper attribution qualifies as academic dishonesty and violates Texas A&M-San Antonio's standards of academic integrity.

Option 4: Customized Policy Generative AI Policy

Faculty may create a customized policy that is unique for a specific course with consultation from the department chair. Faculty are encouraged to view Texas A&M University's Generative AI Syllabus Statement Considerations when preparing a customized AI policy.
