Course Description

The second half of the organic chemistry sequence intended for science majors. A study of the structures, syntheses and reactions of organic compounds. Prerequisites: CHEM 2323 and CHEM 2123. Corequisite: CHEM 2125.

Course Materials

Textbook: Organic Chemistry: A Learner Centered Approach by Richard Mullins (1st ed).

Homework: Homework will be assigned online from Pearson's MyLab and Mastering Chemistry.

Learning Objectives: By the end of this course students will be able to:

- correlate structure with reactivity and function through spectroscopy (MS, IR, NMR) and computational simulations
- understand bonding and its consequences on molecular structure and reactivity
- understand interplay between electronic, steric, and orbital interactions in the behavior and properties of molecules
- understand the dependence of structure and reactivity on context, particularly solvent effects and other non-covalent interactions
- understand Lewis and Brønsted acid-base chemistry
- understand stereochemistry and conformational analysis
- understand addition, elimination, substitution and rearrangement mechanisms, and reactive intermediates
- understand functional groups and their interconversions, particularly redox transformations
- understand organic synthesis
- understand synthesis and behavior of macromolecular species
- understand acid/base chemistry, free radical chemistry, and organometallic catalysis

Attendance Policy: All students are expected to attend all classes and be fully and actively engaged. Attendance will be monitored. If you are absent, you are responsible for the material covered and are expected to get notes, announcements, and any other material from another student in the class. Use of any AI-generated content

in this course qualifies as academic dishonesty and violates Texas A&M-San Antonio's standards of academic integrity.

Homework: All homework will be assigned via Mastering chemistry which is available through blackboard. Homework sets will be assigned and become available at the start of every week. These assignments will be due by Sunday evening every week. I encourage you to work on a few problems after every class to reinforce the lecture material. You will be required to successfully complete homework problems by their due date/time to receive credit your homework. The lowest 2 homework scores will be dropped, and access is available for the week. As such no homework will not be excused nor will extensions be granted

Exams: Exams will be done during the class hour. There will be **no makeup examinations for unexcused absences!** If you miss a test due to illness, you must provide a doctor's note and notify the instructor within 24 hours of the test date. Should you miss two or more exams via an unexcused absence a grade of F will be assigned. Should you have a question concerning the way that your examination was graded, or if you think that there was an error in calculation the exam score, then it is your responsibility to bring the matter to the attention of the instructor within three calendar days of the date when your exam grades were posted. The three-day policy applies to all 100-point exams, except the last 100-point examination. Students have until the day of their final examination to bring up grading concerns. No extra examination time will be given, the only time that the students have to work on the examination is the allotted time.

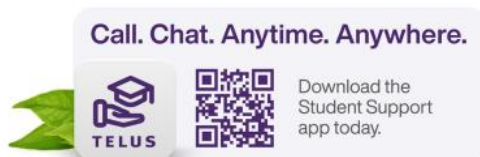
