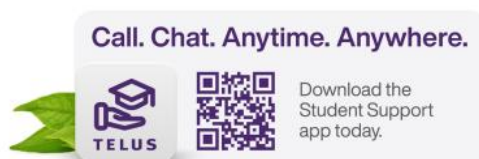

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance: According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. Class Attendance:

A vital part of every student's education is regular attendance of class meetings. Any absences tend to lower the quality of a student's work in a course, and frequent or persistent absences may preclude a passing grade or cause a student to be dropped from one or more courses upon the request of a faculty member to the Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs.

If you cannot participate in a lab, you must have documentation (hurt ankle, sick, etc.), otherwise you will receive half credit for being there but not participating.

This includes not participating in one or more assessments for that lab.

If you completely miss a lab and have no documentation, 20 points will be deducted from the written assignment.

Points will be deducted from any participation grade that may be required of class as a result of unexcused absences.

In-class exams will have test sheets provided. Online tests will be taken on Blackboard and these are also intended for you to work INDIVIDUALLY. If you are caught collaborating with others during online testing, you will be reprimanded.

A grade of “C” or better must be earned in this course to satisfy Kinesiology requirements. Majors who do not earn a grade of “C” or better will be required to repeat the course. I do not round up or round down your grade. If you earn an 89.9, then you earn a B. If you earn an 80.0, then you earn a B, not a C.

Research Presentation:

You will be assigned a group and topic (Team Schedule) You will present in person and will create a presentation using the PowerPoint template (Blackboard). The presentations will be ORIGINAL WORK, last no longer than 12 minutes and no less than 10 minutes. Please prepare and practice together as the initial evaluation and grade is team based. Time after the presentation will be allowed for questions from the audience. It is expected that the class will interact with the presenters once the presentation is complete. You and your partner(s) will gather one article for each team member (COMPLETE ARTICLE PDF's) on the related movement disease/disorder/injury for which you will be presenting. These articles must be peer reviewed original research (NOT review, magazine, newspaper, editorial, etc.) If you need clarification on the articles, feel free to ask me. You must turn in your PowerPoint slides (Assignment Dropbox in Blackboard) on the due date LISTED ON THE SYLLABUS FOR YOUR GROUP (or earlier) in advance so I can post them in case students would like to review before class. ONLY ONE PERSON FROM THE GROUP IS TO TURN IN THE PRESENTATION. Failure to do this will result in a 10-point reduction of your presentation. There will be a 10-point late penalty if the PPT document is turned in late. It must be turned in with the following title of the document, "FALL 25 3315 Group #, Topic, Last Names of Members" When submitting the articles, you must submit COMPLETE articles, not only the abstract or web address. So, pay attention to the due dates for your group and times due. A minute late is late. Each DAY the PPT is late will incur an additional 10-point late penalty.

Attendance of non-presenting groups is REQUIRED during other presentations. If you do not attend these presentations, you will have points deducted from your grade. There will be questions on the final exam from the student presentations and related audience questions and answers.
