Catalog Course Description: This course will integrate knowledge from introductory security courses with knowledge from data science and analytics. Major subjects include: cyber operations and management, cyber defense and offense, malware analysis, and reverse engineering. This course will be built based on NIST NICE cyber framework.

Prerequisite: C or better

in [MATH 1314](#), [CSCI 1436](#) or [CSEC 1436](#), [CSCI 1437](#) or [CSEC 1437](#), [CSCI 2336](#) or [CSEC 2336](#) or [CSEC 3309](#), [CSCI 3321](#) or [CSEC 3321](#).

Course Objectives: Develop the ability to collect, analyze, evaluate and correlate for the efficient operation and management of Cyber Intelligence (across all facets: Hardware, Software, Infrastructure, Malware, OSINT data) , to enable organizations to identify assets, adversarial capabilities, relationships and emerging cyber threats.

Student Outcomes: Upon completion of this course, students will have the ability to:

- 1) Define Intelligence Requirements, from all Cyber Layers, with proper collection and evaluation mechanisms.
- 2) Develop an adversarial mindset needed for performing Cyber Defense operations and management using relationships, frameworks as proposed by the NICE/NIST.
- 3) Apply structured intelligence and orchestrate efficient security/threat analytics by exposure to various tools.
- 4) Aggregate prior foundational CSEC knowledge to build an end-end Cyber Intel pipeline, with appropriate evaluation methodologies.
- 5) Develop academic research skills to enable sustained learning in this dynamic field.

Required Materials:

- **Textbook:** There is no fixed textbook for this course. Lecture slides and relevant research work/reference material links will be posted on Blackboard Ultra.
This course follows an adapted version of “The NICE Cyber Security Framework, Cyber Security Intelligence and Analytics” by Dr. Izzat Alsmadi- Students do **NOT need to buy this book , slides/reference materials would be released on Blackboard.*
- **Blackboard:** Connect to <http://tamusa.blackboard.com>. You will have lecture notes and other supplementary materials in Blackboard. All class communications will be through Blackboard and students should monitor this several times a day.
- **Time:** You are expected to spend 4-8 hours per week for the course. This might vary based on the student's background and during exams/assignment submissions.

This course consists of a semester long research project. Students will propose their own ideas. The Instructor may provide ideas, if needed. **An “industry-grade” project is not needed.*
