Course Description:

Incorporating many perspectives, this course examines pre-Columbian societies, colonial America, the American revolution, the early republic, westward expansion, and the Civil War, among other topics. TSI Restriction(s): Reading and Writing.

Course Learning Outcomes:

1. Create a thesis argument through the use of historical evidence.
2. Analyze and interpret primary and secondary sources.
3. Analyze the effects of historical, social, political, economic, cultural, and global forces on this period of United States history.
4. Develop analytical writing skills

Required texts

Primary text: Joseph L. Locke and Ben Wright. *The American Yawp: A Massively Collaborative Open U.S. History Textbook, Vol. 1: To 1877*. Stanford, California: Stanford University Press, 2019. <https://www.americanyawp.com/index-first-edition.html>

Attendance will be taken in every class and considered in the final grade. You are required to attend class, be on time, and participate in class discussions by completing the readings and assignments for each week. There will be no earbuds, cell phones, and students will be expected to be engaged in the course and the discussion. It amounts to class participation, which will enhance the student experience and the student's overall ability to complete the course successfully.

An absence from class for school-sponsored functions will be considered an excused absence. Students must notify the instructor in advance of the absence, with supporting documentation of the school-sponsored event. This applies to any potential make-up exams as well.

Academic Misconduct and Plagiarism

We will discuss properly citing any primary or secondary sources you use in your work this term. Your work will be reviewed for plagiarism using institutional services, and if any failure to note work through citations is indicated, the grade for the work will be impacted. The instructor is

always available if you have any questions about properly citing your work. You can also utilize the university Writing, Language, and Digital Composing Center for assistance.

No Use of Generative AI Permitted

It will be assumed that all work submitted by students will be generated by the students themselves, working individually or in groups. Students should not have another person/entity do the writing of any portion of an assignment for them, which includes hiring a person or a company to write assignments and/or using artificial intelligence (AI) tools like ChatGPT. Use of any AI-generated content in this course qualifies as academic dishonesty and violates Texas A&M-San Antonio's standards of academic integrity. Submitted work will be checked through Turnitin within Blackboard to check for plagiarism and AI-generated content.

****The Primary Source Analysis and all three parts of the Final Paper will be submitted using **MS Word** and uploaded to BB (text and google docs is not authorized). All Students have access to MS 365 through the university.****

1. *Discussion Posts and Reflection Papers* will be assigned alternately throughout the course. Any references to the course text or outside sources must be cited in your work. These will be submitted electronically in BB as a post or uploaded MS Word file.
2. *Unit Quizzes* will be multiple-choice. Unit 1 and 2 will be posted in Blackboard. Unit 3 Quiz will be taken in person in class the last week of term. Each unit quiz will cover 4 to 5 chapters. These assignments will serve as evidence of learning on the course subjects assigned throughout the term.
3. All students who take core curriculum courses such as HIST 1301 or 1302 must complete an individual assignment called the *CORE Curriculum Assessment*. The *Primary Source Analysis* is a written assignment due at midterm that will fulfill the CORE requirement. It will also replace a midterm exam. You will choose from a list of primary source documents provided to you in the instructions that pertain to the historical period covered in the class. You will examine and research the document and complete the assignment in accordance with the posted instructions on Blackboard. You will cite any resources used to complete this project using MLA or APA citations.
4. The *Final Essay* will serve as your final exam. There will not be a test taken. Your final paper will be broken up into three parts: the Topic Proposal, Abstract/Outline with bibliography, and Final Essay. You must complete all three parts to receive full credit for the assignment. Instructions are included in BB.

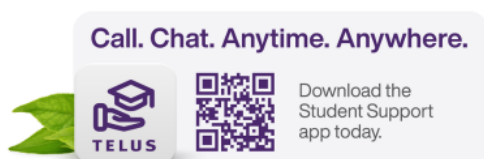

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance: According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance. Faculty will provide the Office of Financial Aid with an electronic notification if a student has not attended by the published Census Date (the first week of class). Any student receiving federal financial aid who does not attend prior to the published Census Date (the first week of class) will have their aid terminated and returned to the DoE. Please note that any student who stops attending at any time during the semester may also need to return a portion of their federal aid.

The Six-Drop Rule: Students are subject to the requirements of Senate Bill (SB) 1231 passed by the Texas Legislature in 2007. SB 1231 limits students to a maximum of six (6) non-punitive course drops (i.e., courses a student chooses to drop) during their undergraduate careers. A non-punitive drop does not affect the student's GPA. However, course drops that exceed the maximum allowed by SB 1231 will be treated as "F" grades and will impact the student's GPA.

Students' Rights and Responsibilities: The following statement of students' rights and responsibilities is intended to reflect the philosophical base upon which University Student Rules are built. Students' Rights
