COURSE DESCRIPTION

Incorporating many perspectives, this course examines pre-Columbian societies, colonial America, the American Revolution, the early Republic, westward expansion, and the Civil War, among other topics.

LEARNING GOALS

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

1. Create a thesis argument through the use of historical evidence.
2. Analyze and interpret primary and secondary sources.
3. Analyze the effects of historical, social, political, economic, cultural, and global forces on this period of United States history.
4. Develop analytical writing skills

Participation & Attendance Policy (5 %):

I take attendance at the beginning of class, so if you enter the class significantly late, you will be counted absent. If you leave class early, you will be counted absent as well. As much of the course work happens in class, missing four classes or more will result in a loss of one letter grade (-10 points) for this class. All students (whether present or absent) are responsible for all announcements made in class and all assignments given in class because it is sometimes necessary to make changes to the syllabus.

Exams (50%):

Two exams will be proctored in class. The exams will be a mix of multiple choice, T/F, matching, short-answer, and essay questions. Before each exam, you will have a review and a study guide to help you prepare for the examination.

Students must clear off their desks and place their phones face down. No headphones are allowed during the test. Students should only leave the room due to emergencies and must leave their phones in the classroom. Students arriving late cannot take the test if students have already completed the test and left the room.

Make-up Exam Policy:

Exams only will be given on the date assigned on the course calendar. Makeup exams only are allowed for emergencies such as debilitating illness, a death in the immediate family, and religious or school functions. In any case, documentation must be provided in order for the student to be allowed a make-up exam. Missed exams must be made up **within one week**. All makeups must be completed before the last day of classes per the academic calendar (prior to final exam week).

In-class Primary Source Essay: *Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass* (20 %):

Students will complete a short in-class essay for *Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass*. Students will need to bring paper and pens to class. The essay should include a strong thesis statement supported by evidence from the text to illustrate the student has completed the assigned book. Staff from the Writing, Language, and Digital Composing Center (WLDCC) will conduct workshops in class throughout the semester covering active reading strategies, discussion of the book, and preparing for the in-class essay.

Weekly Historical Inquiry (20%):

Approximately once each week, students will submit a short response to a post created by the instructor on a Blackboard discussion forum. Students should provide thoughtful replies and engage with previous insights posted by their classmates. Responses will be assessed on a 3-point historical inquiry scale. Strong historical thinking will directly answer the question, use relevant historical evidence, explain the significance/connection of the evidence. The peer comment will respond to one classmate in 1-2 sentences and is “required for full credit.” Peer responses will identify one piece of evidence or

reasoning from response that you found convincing and explain why. Replies submitted late will not be accepted.

San Antonio Missions Field Study 5%

As part of this course students will participate in a field study at Mission San José. This experience connects classroom learning with one of the nation's most significant historical sites by exploring the history of Spanish colonization, indigenous communities, the mission system, architecture, and cultural exchange that shaped colonial Texas. During the field study, students will observe and analyze historical resources, engage with interpretive materials, and complete assignments that emphasize historical inquiry, critical thinking, and the evaluation of primary and secondary sources. This field study is a required component of the course, supporting learning outcomes in applying historical analysis and historical inquiry in a real-world setting.

Extensions, and Late Assignments Policy:

Make-up work and exams are only allowed for emergencies such as debilitating illness, a death in the immediate family, and religious or school functions. In any case, documentation must be provided in order for the student to be allowed a make-up exam.

University Email Policy and Course Communications: All correspondence between the instructor and students must occur via University email accounts. You must have Jaguar email account ready and working. The instructor will distribute course materials, including announcements and updates, via Blackboard, so students should log in to the course site in Blackboard regularly.

Academic Misconduct Policy:

All student term papers and other written assignments are subject to analysis by antiplagiarism software. In my class, plagiarism or cheating on a test will result in a 0 for that assignment and reporting of the violation.

No Use of Generative AI Permitted

HIST 1301 assumes that all work submitted by students will be generated by the students themselves, working individually or in groups. Students should not have another person/entity do the writing of any portion of an assignment for them, which includes hiring a person or a company to write assignments and/or using artificial intelligence (AI) tools like ChatGPT. Use of any AI-generated content in this course qualifies as academic dishonesty and violates Texas A&M-San Antonio's standards of academic integrity.

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance

According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance. The Six-Drop Rule

Students are subject to the requirements of Senate Bill (SB) 1231 passed by the Texas Legislature in 2007. SB 1231 limits students to a maximum of six (6) non-punitive course drops (i.e., courses a student chooses to drop) during their undergraduate careers. A non-punitive drop does not affect the student's GPA. However, course drops that exceed the maximum allowed by SB 1231 will be treated as "F" grades and will impact the student's GPA.

Pregnant/Parenting Students

Texas A&M-San Antonio does not require a pregnant or parenting student, solely because of that status or issues related to that status, to (1) take a leave of absence or withdraw from their degree or certificate program; (2) limit the student's studies; (3) participate in an alternative program; (4) change the student's major, degree, or certificate program; or (5) refrain from joining or cease participating in any course, activity, or program at the University. Students' Rights and Responsibilities

The following statement of students' rights and responsibilities is intended to reflect the philosophical base upon which University Student Rules are built. This philosophy acknowledges the existence of both rights and responsibilities, which is inherent to an individual not only as a student at Texas A&M University-San Antonio but also as a citizen of this country.

Students' Rights

1. A student shall have the right to participate in a free exchange of ideas, and there shall be no University rule or administrative rule that in any way abridges the rights of freedom of speech, expression, petition and peaceful assembly as set forth in the U.S. Constitution.
2. Each student shall have the right to participate in all areas and activities of the University, free from any form of discrimination, including harassment, on the basis of race, color, national or ethnic origin, religion, sex, disability, age, and pregnancy/parenting or veteran status in accordance with applicable federal and state laws.
3. A student has the right to personal privacy except as otherwise provided by law, and this will be observed by students and University authorities alike.
4. Each student subject to disciplinary action arising from violations of university students' rules shall be assured a fundamentally fair process.

Students' Responsibilities

1. A student has the responsibility to respect the rights and property of others, including other students, the faculty, and administration.
2. A student has the responsibility to be fully acquainted with the published University Student Rules found in the Student Handbook, Student Code of Conduct, on our website, and University Catalog, and to comply with them, as well as with federal, state, and local laws.
3. A student has the responsibility to recognize that student actions reflect upon the individuals involved and upon the entire University community.
