Course Overview

An introduction to the study of international law. This course examines the definition, object and sources of international law as well as its relationship to domestic law and to the study of international relations. Prerequisite(s): GOVT 2305 and GOVT 2306. TSI Restriction(s): Reading, and Writing

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course students should be able to demonstrate knowledge of the following topics:

1. Understand what the sources of international law are
2. Understand how international law is developed, implemented, and enforced.
3. Understand the main topics of international law (e.g. trade law, international humanitarian law, etc.)
4. Be able to identify, define, and construct a persuasive legal argument using primary and secondary sources

Course Requirements

Exams - There are two exams in this course, a midterm and a final exam. The exams will consist of several essay questions and will take place in class and are scheduled in the syllabus (see below). The midterm exam will be worth 100 points and the final exam will be worth 150 points.

Treaty Summaries – Students are required to complete two treaty summary assignments during the first half of the semester. Each summary should be 2-3 pages in length. Each summary should describe the purpose of the treaty, what the enforcement mechanisms are, and how and when the treaty goes into effect. More details are on Blackboard. Each summary is worth 25 points.

Case Briefs – Students are required to complete two case briefs during the second half of the semester. Each case brief should be 2-3 pages in length. Each case brief should summarize who the actors involved are, what the facts of the case are, what the judicial decisions is and what the legal reasoning is, and if applicable, what any penalties involved are. More details are provided on Blackboard. Each brief is worth 25 points.

Moot Court – In lieu of a research project students in this course will complete a moot court simulation at the end of the semester. More information on the specific requirements of the moot court will be provided early in the semester, but the basics of the moot court is a trial of Vladimir Putin for war crimes, crimes against humanity, and crimes of aggression involving Russia's invasion of Ukraine. The class will be divided into three groups – prosecution, defense, and judges. All students will be required to produce written assignments for the mock trial – either legal briefs or judicial opinions as well as participate in the trial itself as prosecutors and defense counsel issuing opening and closing statements and oral arguments, or judges participating in oral arguments and reading their opinions. The entire moot court process is worth 150 points.

Class Participation – Students are expected to complete all assigned readings for each class period, and they are also expected to participate in class discussion. Participation is worth 50 points total.

Attendance Policy

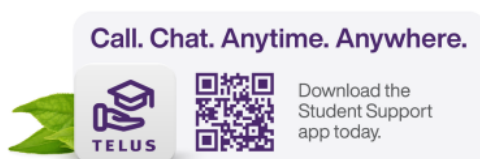

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance: According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance. Faculty will provide the Office of Financial Aid with an electronic notification if a student has not attended by the published Census Date (the first week of class). Any student receiving federal financial aid who does not attend prior to the published Census Date (the first week of class) will have their aid terminated and returned to the DoE. Please note that any student who stops attending at any time during the semester may also need to return a portion of their federal aid.
