Catalog Course Description: MGMT 4331. International Business Management. 3(3-0)

This course provides an overview of the environment, concepts, and basic differences involved in international business. By taking this course, students will become aware of the “macro” necessities and facts for doing business across national borders, which include the assessment of nations as cultural/political/economic/legal systems, pros and cons of globalization, characteristics of multinational corporations, foreign direct investment, international trade theory, foreign exchange markets, foreign entry modes, trade agreements, comparison of nations based on their associated risk tiers, etc. Upon completion, students should be able to describe the foundations of international business. Prerequisites: MGMT 3311

Course Objectives:

1. Cultivating an international business mindset to tackle complex, organization-wide challenges in a globalized environment.
2. Enhancing managerial and organizational abilities to address real-world issues faced by international companies in their overseas operations.
3. Gaining a comprehensive understanding of how your role as a future global executive contributes to your organization's success by applying and integrating the business skills and knowledge you have acquired.
4. Promoting Ethics and Sustainability: Evaluate ethical dilemmas, corporate social responsibility initiatives, and sustainable business practices in the context of global operations.
5. Applying Trade and Investment Theories: Demonstrate knowledge of international trade theories, government policies, regional economic integration, and their implications for business decision-making.
6. Navigating the Global Monetary System: Explain the functioning of foreign exchange markets, and international monetary system, to understand their effects on international business strategies.

7. Strategizing for International Markets: Develop and assess strategies for entering and competing in both developed and emerging markets while considering organizational structure and global competition.
8. Managing International Business Functions: Apply concepts of global production, supply chain management and marketing.

Required Materials:

- **Blackboard Ultra:** Connect to <http://tamusa.blackboard.com>. You will have SmartBook (readings+integrated quizzes), written assignments, PowerPoint slides, recorded Zoom chapter lectures, and other supplementary materials in Connect.
- **Computer Hardware:** You will need a computer with an Internet connection, a microphone, a camera, and speakers/headphones.
- **Time Expectations for coursework:** You are expected to spend 4-8 hours per week for the course. Based on the background, some students may require more time. Time spent may be longer when assignment/exams are due.

Course Requirements every student must fulfill in order to succeed in course:

1. Students should check the Course Calendar, Announcements, and Messages (e-mail) systems in Blackboard on a regular basis.
2. Students should keep current with all course assignments, quizzes, and examinations.
3. Students should ask questions and communicate with the instructor online, off-line or during office hours.
4. For all classwork, exams, quizzes etc., if a student is completing it off-campus, then they are responsible for availability of internet connectivity. Extensions will not be granted for lack of availability of internet connections.
5. Students should remember that online and hybrid courses assume greater responsibility and independent learning skills by the student for their own learning outcomes.
6. For online courses, students should keep current on class recordings, if not attending the live class online.
7. For online asynchronous courses, there will be voluntary weekly sessions. All materials will be made available through Blackboard or through online links.

Grading Policy: The final course grade will be based on your performance on the quizzes, exams, assignments and class participation using the following weights:

Connect Assignments including Smartbook: The first task in each chapter lesson should be to read the Smartbook assignment in Connect. You should follow up with the other assignments in each Connect

Chapter module. Smartbook and other Connect assignments will be available online for one week. There will be no makeup opportunities for missed assignments. Stay up to date with all chapter assignments. Connect will be accessible in Blackboard under the Content from Connect tab.

Tests: You will have four tests during the semester and these will be administered via Proctorio, which is a learning integrity resource designed to protect the integrity of this course's assessments.

You'll be able to see which assignments in Connect include Proctorio settings because they will be clearly labeled with "Proctoring Enabled" in the assignment title. Proctorio includes a recording of video, audio, and screen activity. ***The Proctorio system requires a webcam and a microphone.*** If your computer is not up to standards, you may take your exams on campus. Approximately one week before your tests, you will have access to a practice test. These practice tests are taken from the same test bank as the proctored tests. You are encouraged to use a practice exam to test your knowledge prior to taking an exam. Each test will consist of 40 multiple choice questions.

Country Comparison: Research and write a paper. no more than 25% of the student work should be generated by AI Country Comparison Specific notes on the preparation of these papers will be distributed later in class.

Use of Generative AI Not Permitted Under Any Circumstances

MGMT 4331 International Business assumes that all work submitted by students will be generated by the students themselves, working individually or in groups. Students should not have another person/entity do the writing of any portion of an assignment for them, which includes hiring a person or a company to write assignments and/or using artificial intelligence (AI) tools, like ChatGPT. Use of any AI-generated content in this course qualifies as academic dishonesty and violates Texas A&M-San Antonio's standards of academic integrity.

Make up and Late Assignment/exam/quiz policy:

As a general rule, make-ups or late submissions will NOT be offered or accepted for any missed assignments/exams/quizzes. Late submissions or make-ups may be accepted/administered only in extraordinary circumstances such as an excused official university activity, a severe illness, or a dire emergency. However, you must provide documentation either before or within a few days of the missed assignment/quiz/exam.

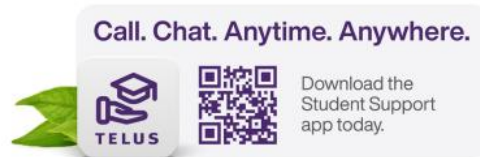

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance: According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance.
