Course Catalog Description:

Procedures and methods of historical research. Introduction to types of historical data, the analysis of sources, the use of computer techniques in historical research and the methods of historical writing. Senior standing.

Student Learner Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1) understand and evaluate the main types of historical primary and secondary source materials.
- 2) develop a topic idea into a thesis.
- 3) improve critical thinking skills through writing and speaking in the creation of an original work of historical research.
- 4) understand how to provide and incorporate peer and professor feedback into a revised paper.

No Extra Credit will be offered. I do not add points onto final grades even if a student is close to another grade.

Graded work should be returned within 2 weeks if not sooner.

Attendance:

Regular attendance is required. I take attendance at the beginning of class, so if you enter the class significantly late, you will be counted absent. If you leave class early, you will be counted absent as well. As much of the course work happens in class, missing four classes or more will result in a loss of one letter grade (-10 points) for this class. This includes individual meetings with the professor as indicated on the syllabus calendar. All students (whether present or absent) are responsible for all announcements made in class and all assignments given in class because it is sometimes necessary to make changes to the syllabus.

Make-ups:

See the major course requirements descriptions later in this syllabus for explanations of late penalties. Makeups will be accepted in the case of documented (in writing) emergencies. All other penalties will be noted below.

Academic Misconduct Policy

Students at Texas A&M University-San Antonio are expected to adhere to the highest standards of academic honesty and integrity. All student term papers and other written assignments are subject to analysis by anti-plagiarism software.

In my class, plagiarism or cheating on a test will result in a 0 for that assignment and reporting of the violation.

AI Policy:

This course assumes that all work submitted by students will be generated by the students themselves. Students may not use Artificial Intelligence (AI) tools such as ChatGPT or any others for writing. Use of any AI-generated work in this course constitutes academic dishonesty and violates Texas A&M-San Antonio's standards of academic integrity.

Research materials related to your topic.

TOPIC, RESEARCH QUESTION, AND THESIS (5%):

Early in the semester you will submit a topic, preliminary research question, and thesis. This is due on **September 14**, in class. This assignment will be accepted for up to five days after the due date but will include a ten-point deduction from the final paper grade.

BIBLIOGRAPHY AND SOURCE ESSAY (5%):

In support of your research topic, you will be required to create and turn-in a bibliography, Turabian style, dealing with the key source materials related to your research topic. Your bibliography will be required to have a minimum of twelve sources (six primary) along with your evaluation of these sources in support of your proposed research topic. You will choose three primary sources for evaluation in a source essay. This evaluation will include an analysis of biases as well as other criteria explained in Benjamin concerning sources evaluation. This is due on **September 28** in class. Failure to submit this on time with at least **12 sources** will result in a 10-point deduction in the final paper grade. This assignment will only be accepted within a five-day window of the due date.

RESEARCH PAPER PROPOSAL (10%):

One of the initial steps in developing your research topic involves the creation of a paper proposal that provides a discussion of your intended research topic, the available sources, and outline of the proposed paper with subheadings, and the significance of the topic to the historical field of inquiry. This is due on **October 5**, in class. This assignment will be accepted up to five days late. Failure to submit this on time will result in a 10-point deduction in your final paper grade.

RESEARCH NOTES :

You will submit research notes (**November 2**) in either hand-written or typed form. You must show evidence of sufficient research to write a 20-page paper. Failure to submit this on time will result in a 10-point deduction in the final paper grade.

RESEARCH PAPER DRAFT (20%):

You will submit a draft of your paper (**November 11**) for professor review prior to submitting the final paper. Failure to submit this on time will result in a 25-point deduction from your final paper grade. The draft will only be accepted up to seven days late. This draft will be submitted to **Turnitin** as well. You must use a file that Turnitin accepts. If you do not have access to Microsoft Word, I can tell you what other files work.

RESEARCH FINAL PAPER (40%):

Minimum length of 18-20-pages, typed, double-spaced, with 1-inch margins and 12-point typeface. Use Turabian-style footnote citations. This will be due on **December 7**, to **Turnitin**

and in class and will not be accepted late. The research paper will not be accepted unless accompanied by the draft with the professor's comments and unless submitted to the Turnitin assignment on blackboard. You must use a file that Turnitin accepts. If you do not have access to Microsoft Word, I can tell you what other files work.

Self-Reflection, Attendance, Participation, Peer Feedback, Library Training, Etc. (5%):

You will provide written feedback to students in class for a portion of the paper draft and the presentation. These are due to the student and professor as noted on class dates in the syllabus. One reflection essay is required to complete the class. The reflection will be due at the time that the paper final draft is due- December 10. There will be some small assignments throughout the semester that include library training and short in-class writing assignments. You will also be graded on participation and attendance.

RESEARCH PAPER PRESENTATION (10%):

At the end of the course, you will be required to present a PowerPoint presentation to your classmates concerning your research topic, sources, findings, and the importance of your project for the field. The presentation must be 10 *minutes* long. These can only be rescheduled in the case of a documented emergency.

*** These assignments are meant to build upon one another ("Stacked"). If a student fails to submit any of these assignments, he or she will not be allowed to continue on to the next step in the research process. If an assignment is turned in but deemed inadequate to continue by the professor, then the student has one week to revise the assignment and turn it in again for consideration to continue the research process.**

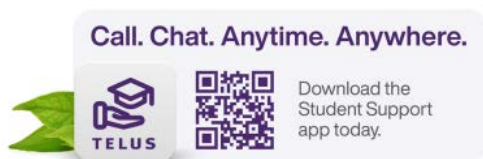

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance: According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance.
