Catalog Description:

4388. Psychological Research and Statistics III. 3(3-0) Advanced instruction in designing, conducting, and analyzing data and research in psychology. Prerequisites: PSYC 2301, PSYC 3488, and PSYC 3088.

Course Description:

This course will continue coverage of research and statistical techniques. Multiple regression, ANCOVA, and MANOVA will be covered, in addition to other techniques deemed appropriate, that may vary by semester. All techniques will be analyzed via SPSS.

Course Objectives

- Students will learn about different research methods in psychology and the strengths and weaknesses of these methods.
- Students will learn how to analyze techniques taught in class via SPSS and JASP.
- Students will conduct research projects more independently than in the first two research and statistics classes.

Assessment of Student Learner Outcomes

Students will evince attainment of course objectives through their performance on the assignments that make up the research project and through their performance on unit exams.

Depending on how the semester is going, some dates may have to be adjusted.

Assignments:

Examinations: There will be three exams and a comprehensive final. Each exam, except the final, is worth an equal amount of the final grade. Your average can be calculated by finding the number of points you have earned and dividing by the total possible number of points.

Multiple choice sections of exams are closed book, and interpreting statistical analysis sections are open book. You will turn in your closed book section before getting out your open book section.

Final exam: In addition to the regular 2 exams, a comprehensive final exam will be given during the final exam period. This exam will count for 150 points.

All exam dates are marked on the calendar. They are subject to change for emergencies.

You will be notified. Otherwise, the syllabus stands.

During exams there will be NO phones, no iPads, no laptops, and no friends. If the exam is in-class and uses SPSS, you will be using a classroom computer.

Homework: Once in each unit (3 times during the semester) you'll be given a homework assignment involving SPSS or JASP.

Research project:

In a group of approximately 3, you will develop a research design that can be analyzed with one of the tests we are learning this semester. The statistical tests encouraged to be utilized are multiple regression, logistic regression, ANCOVA, and mixed-model ANOVA. Partial correlations may be included.

You will submit an IRB form for your project by September 17, and when approved, collect your data from the psychology subject pool or any other source that can be approved in an expedited or exempt IRB review. There will not be time in the semester to complete a project that needs full review.

While waiting on your IRB approval, please work on your literature review, which must be about 4 pages long. You may also write out your procedures in detail so you are prepared to finish your method section when your data is collected.

After collecting data, please analyze it on SPSS. I am available for help if you cannot do it on your own, but by the time your data is ready to analyze, you will have completed most all of these tests on SPSS yourself. JASP may also be used, but please understand that you will need to have Excel expertise to set up your data set.

Put the results into a power point (or other program) for a professional oral presentation. In addition, you will be writing the paper in APA style as a manuscript to turn in. All work on this project is collaborative, and students in one group should receive the same grade.

Details of the project:

All papers will be in APA format, 7th edition, and will follow all APA guidelines for publication of the research.

Research paper information:

1. In this class, students will be learning collaboration. Therefore, the paper and power point presentation are done in pairs. They are not done individually.
2. You must have a table or figure describing your results.

1. Format for numbers: $F(2,24)=.4.68, p<.003$. Include this in a sentence. Don't just write it and be done.
2. APA style title page, abstract, and reference sections are necessary. Please use professional submission style, not student style.
3. Remember: Ten references is a minimum.
4. Breakdown of an APA-Style Paper:
 - a. Title page (with running head)
 - b. Abstract
 - c. Literature review (4 pages total), ending in hypotheses
 - d. Method
 - i. Participants
 - ii. Materials
 - iii. Procedure
 - iv. Overall: Does your design make sense and can I understand it?
 - e. Results
 - i. Use proper format for numbers, and embedded well into sentences
 - ii. Graph or table
 - iii. Explanation follows hypothesis
 - f. Discussion
 - i. Conclusion
 - ii. Limitations
 - iii. Future Directions
 - g. References
 - i. Correct APA Style
 - ii. Ten references MINIMUM
 - iii. All are cited in text
 - iv. References are appropriate

FAQ and helpful hints:

- **You may NOT use secondary sources.** You must use primary sources. If Jones and Rodriguez talk about DeLuna's article, go find the DeLuna article and cite it as a primary source. You have no idea whether Jones and Rodriguez interpreted DeLuna correctly, so you should always go straight to the main source. **Your textbooks are secondary sources.** If you find a cool study in the textbook, it will be cited in the textbook. Use the citation to find the original source and use that in your paper, **not** the textbook.
- **Avoid contractions** in a formal paper.
- Proofread your paper. Make sure your sentences make sense.
- Your sources must be peer reviewed academic sources. **This includes academic journal articles.** Dissertations are not peer-reviewed. Online sources that do not come from PsycInfo or equivalent are not academic. Google Scholar does have academic references, but it also has sources that are not acceptable; make sure you vet your sources carefully when using Google Scholar.
- Check with me if you want to use a book. Many are academic, but pop psychology books are not. You will learn the difference in time. I can help you now.
- Each one of the ten references in your paper must be cited in your paper using the appropriate APA style in-text citation.
- All papers will go to turnitin.com automatically when you turn them in. I will put up the site on Bb a week early. You may submit your paper, look for paraphrasing problems that could be considered plagiarism, correct them, and resubmit. I highly recommend using this feature. Paraphrasing is not easy, and you don't want to get busted for academic dishonesty. I will not look at the papers until the end of the due date, so you may submit as many times as you like, and I will only see your final paper. Remember that you will be doing this in groups of 3, so you will put it on one of your Bb accounts for turnitin.com. Do not use both accounts—it will say that you

plagiarized yourself. Only one partner may submit. All your names will be on the cover sheet.

Presentation: you will be given 15 minutes to present your research with your group and there are 5 minutes between each presentation to answer questions from the class and move to the next presentation. Please create a power point for a professional conference-style presentation. Be prepared to answer questions on your project AND on your analysis. You will be evaluating each other's presentations as well, and graded on your evaluations.

Power point requirements:

*Introduce your topic using info from your lit review. Cite your sources both in the text and at the end.

*Make sure that clear hypotheses are depicted in your ppt.

*Include method information, containing demographics and materials, with citations of scales.

*Show a clear design with your analysis plan, and then results of your analysis. Include tables or figures from your paper.

*Include a slide or two with your discussion/conclusion.

Conferences: Your presentation should be worthy of presenting at a conference. You do not have to have significance to present at a conference. There are a few options:

1. Southwestern Psychological Association (SWPA) is April 1-3 in Houston, TX. The program will pay for hotel if you stay in rooms of 3-4 students. You will need to pay registration and your travel. If a faculty member is able to drive the school suburban, there may be an option for you to get free travel. Otherwise, students carpool together.
2. Student Research Symposium during the JagRISE week on campus. Information will be shared as it is available. You may present at both this conference AND SWPA if you'd like.

I would like to see each group present at a conference if at all possible. The SWPA conference will involve some travel costs, and if that is not possible, JagRISE is free.

Workshops: You have already taken the APA and Plagiarism workshops in PSYC 2388. If you need a refresher, those courses are available through the libguides on the library's website.

Citi Training

Students will need to produce evidence of current Citi Training completion. If yours expires during the semester, the renewal takes less time than the original training. Please go to citiprogram.org for details. Citi training is only good for 3 years, depending on when you took it. Our university requires Social and Behavioral Sciences and Intro to Responsible Conduct of Research for these IRB submissions. Students typically do SBR during RS1, but they often haven't done the second training. You will need to do that now. Please turn in *score reports*, not the certificates.

Psychology Speaker Series

Students are to attend one psychology speaker this year. You may sign up on SONA for any speakers sponsored by our university.

Course Grades

Each student's grade will be based solely on his/her performance. Students will not compete against one another for grades (i.e., the instructor will not limit the number of As, Bs, etc.). An individual's course grade is based on his or her raw score points (i.e., the total number of points earned during the semester). For example, using the table below, a student who earns 850 points during the semester will earn a "B." A student who has a total of 642 points at the end of the semester will earn a "D" in the course.

Because many of our assignments rely on the progress of the projects, and the speed of the IRB, points may be moved around if we are not able to do all the drafts in time.

What Happens If I am Not Getting the Grade I Want?

Here are some pointers:

1. **Do all the assignments.** So many students perform poorly because they “forget” to do all the work. Be here and do assignments.
2. If it's multiple choice you are having trouble with, try to **make your own multiple-choice quiz** on the chapter before the test. You won't believe how well you actually have to know the chapter to do that. This means not just the questions—make sure you come up with four possible answers, and that you know which one is correct.
3. You are welcome to **see me in my office hours**, especially if you have specific questions. I am holding them over zoom after class. If you are going to ask me how you can perform better, we will look at your grades, and then I will probably tell you to do #1 and #2. If you need one-on-one study skills help, we have a new office for you to visit! Please see #4 below.
4. **Go to the Student Academic Success Center.** Here is what they have sent us:
The Student Academic Success Center (SASC) offers one-on-one appointments and walk-in sessions to Texas A&M University-San Antonio students. The Center will also offer online and face-to-face group sessions on topics such as time management, note-taking in College, study skills, goal setting, reading strategies, test taking tips, and stress management. Make-Up or Late Work:

Assignments which are turned in on time must be turned in within the first five minutes of the class time in which it is due, unless I have specified another time. If it is due at a certain time on a day the class is not held, it is one day late at 5 minutes after the time set by the instructor. Each day the assignment is late, ten

percentage points will be taken off the grade for the assignment. For example, if a student turns in a perfect assignment two days late, the grade for the assignment will be an 80%. This goes for **papers** only. Homework may not be turned in once the class goes over the homework. If students would like feedback and missed a homework assignment, they may come to office hours to discuss the material.

If you wake up sick or for some reason cannot make it to a test, you must leave me a message on the office phone or email me or text me on Remind **BEFORE** the test. Notifying me beforehand does not guarantee you will be able to make it up, but your request will be heard. If you are leaving town on a planned trip, let me know well in advance so we can plan to have you take it before you leave.

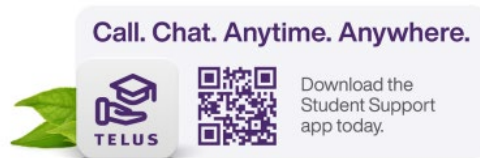

Young Jaguars can support parenting students with daycare if students meet this criteria: (1) must be enrolled in classes at Texas A&M-San Antonio in the current semester, (2) must be Pell eligible or a single parent, (3) child(ren) must be aged 3 to 12-years-old, and (4) child(ren) must be enrolled in Pre-K-3 through 6th grade. Students' Rights and Responsibilities: The following statement of students' rights and responsibilities is intended to reflect the philosophical base upon which University Student Rules are built. This philosophy acknowledges the existence of both rights and responsibilities, which is inherent to an individual not only as a student at Texas A&M University-San Antonio but also as a citizen of this country.

Students' Rights

2. 3. A student has the right to personal privacy except as otherwise provided by law, and this will be observed by students and University authorities alike.
4. Each student subject to disciplinary action arising from violations of university student rules shall be assured a fundamentally fair process.

Students' Responsibilities

1. A student has the responsibility to respect the rights and property of others, including other students, the faculty, and administration.
2. A student has the responsibility to be fully acquainted with the published University Student Rules found in the Student Handbook, [Student Code of Conduct](#), on our website, and University Catalog, and to comply with them, as well as with federal, state, and local laws.
3. A student has the responsibility to recognize that student actions reflect upon the individuals involved and upon the entire University community.

4. A student has the responsibility to recognize the University's obligation to provide a safe environment for learning.
5. A student has the responsibility to check their university email for any updates or official university notifications.

We expect that students will behave in a manner that is dignified, respectful, and courteous to all people, regardless of sex, ethnic/racial origin, religious background, or disability. Conduct that infringes on the rights of another individual will not be tolerated.

Students are expected to exhibit a high level of honesty and integrity in their pursuit of higher education. Students engaging in an act that violates the standards of academic integrity will find themselves facing academic and/or disciplinary sanctions. Academic misconduct is any act, or attempt, which gives an unfair advantage to the student.
