COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

QUIZZES

There will be weekly quizzes covering the material from that week. These quiz questions will serve as a bank of knowledge for midterm and final exams. These will be in multiple choice format. You will have three attempts to take the quiz, with the highest score being the score recorded. Typically, these will be due Sunday evenings of that academic week by 11:59 PM, but there are exceptions for short weeks due to holidays or testing schedules.

VIDEO RESPONSES

There will be six opportunities to engage with our Jaguar community through the use of video responses to questions and topics throughout the course. These responses will be available for submission in multiple video formats. You will be required to respond to **TWO** of your classmates as part of your grade **by the end of the assigned week**. The assignments will be based on questions related to selected primary sources from *The American Yawp Reader* and other selected primary sources.

EXAMS

There will be two exams: one midterm and one final. The exams are given in multiple choice and essay format in order to allow you to demonstrate your understanding of historical topics and to provide your own interpretations of historical events and themes. It is more important that you be able to exhibit critical thinking skills than to recall names and dates. **These exams will require use of the Repondus LockDown Browser.**

Prior to each exam, you will be provided with a list of five possible essay questions to study. Of those five, I will select two to be on the exam.

Exams will be cumulative (the midterm will cover all material prior and the final will cover all material from the semester), BUT the questions will be based on lecture, the textbook, previous quizzes, and supplementary readings.

WRITING ASSIGNMENT

You will be required to write one reflection essay utilizing *Coming of Age in Mississippi*. The reflection essay must be at least 900 words in length (but no more than 1,500 words), double-spaced, Times New Roman font, with standard 1-inch margins and 12-point font. Cite your sources in either footnotes or in-text citations. **The rubric, prompt and specific expectations will be provided in advance through the course modules.** This assignment will be discussed in further detail in the weekly lectures online. **No internet sources are allowed for this assignment.**

PROJECT

You will be required to develop a slideshow over an assigned significant event/ theme from Chapter 15-18 of the textbook. The presentation will be on either PowerPoint or Google Slides and will include a recorded audio presentation component. This presentation should be designed appropriately and include a minimum of 10 and no more than 15 slides. **A rubric and specific requirements will be available in the course modules in advance.**

Blackboard: This course has a Blackboard site, which is where your grades and assignment links will be posted. Powerpoint slides, lectures, and course announcements will also be posted to Blackboard.

Make-Up Exams: Make-up exams are only allowed for emergencies such as debilitating illness, a death in the immediate family, and religious or school functions. In any case, you must provide documentation of your absence in order to be allowed a make-up exam.

Late Paper/ Assignment Policy: I do not accept late papers/ assignments. All assignments must be turned in by the deadline.

Communication: Email me regarding questions or concerns that you might have. I will do my best to respond within one day. You may also schedule an appointment to speak with me during virtual office hours.

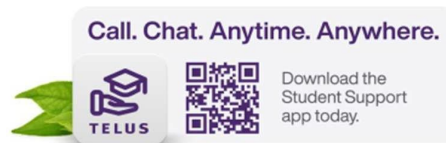

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance: According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance. Faculty will provide the Office of Financial Aid with an electronic notification if a student has not attended by the published Census Date (the first week of class). Any student receiving federal financial aid who does not attend prior to the published Census Date (the first week of class) will have their aid terminated and returned to the DoE. Please note that any student who stops attending at any time during the semester may also need to return a portion of their federal aid.

SB 1231 limits students to a maximum of six (6) non-punitive course drops (i.e., courses a student chooses to drop) during their undergraduate careers. A non-punitive drop does not affect the student’s GPA. However, course drops that exceed the maximum allowed by SB 1231 will be treated as “F” grades and will impact the student’s GPA.
