Course Description and Materials

Catalog Description

The course encompasses the study of limits, continuity, and derivatives of algebraic, trigonometric and transcendental functions and related applications to include maximizing or minimizing a function and rate of change problems. This course also introduces the definite integral, the Fundamental Theorem of Calculus and application to calculation of areas. Curve sketching and graphing tools will be utilized in exploring these concepts.

Math 2313 helps students develop Critical Thinking, Communication, and Empirical and Quantitative Skills by focusing on student understanding of the calculus concepts to include recognizing, identifying, solving, analyzing, and explaining, and appropriately modeling applicable real -world situations.

Prerequisite: Math 2312 Pre-Calculus with a grade of “C” or higher, or equivalent, or permission by the department.

Required eTextbook and Online Homework Platform

WebAssign for Stewart’s *Essential Calculus: Early Transcendentals*, 2nd Edition (ISBN: 9781337772198). Included in student fees. No purchase necessary.

Calculators

Basic scientific calculators (non-graphing, non-programmable) are permitted on quizzes and exams. A TI-30XIIS scientific calculator is highly recommended. Cell phones, graphing calculators, and online math utilities are not allowed on quizzes or exams. When appropriate, more advanced calculators and software may be used on homework assignments and during class discussion.

Student Learner Objectives:

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Develop solutions for tangent and area problems using the concepts of limits, derivatives, and integrals.
2. Interpret and draw graphs of algebraic and transcendental functions considering limits, continuity, and differentiability at a point.
3. Determine and explain whether a function is continuous and/or differentiable at a point using limits.
4. Apply differentiation rules to differentiate algebraic and transcendental functions.
5. Identify and apply appropriate calculus concepts and techniques to provide mathematical models of real-world situations, and to determine and explain solutions to applied problems.
6. Evaluate definite integrals using the Fundamental Theorem of Calculus.
7. Recognize and articulate the relationship between derivatives and integrals using the Fundamental Theorem of Calculus.

Homework:

Homework will be completed online through WebAssign. All due dates are listed in WebAssign. Students may ask for one extension per semester, and one assignment score is dropped. Students are also encouraged to practice writing solutions and will be responsible for knowing how to write clear, justified solutions on quizzes and exams.

Quizzes/Other Assignments

Quizzes will be given weekly on Thursdays (except on exam days), beginning the second week of class. Your top five quiz scores will count toward your grade. There will be no make-up quizzes. Additionally, written assignments may be assigned as homework or classwork. These assignments are due when announced.

Midterm Exams:

There will be three in-class exams during the semester. The tentative dates are September 24, October 22, and November 19. In case you miss an exam or find out that you will miss an exam, you should contact me either in person or by e-mail, at least one week in advance of the exam for non-emergency cases or within 24-hrs of the scheduled exam date for emergency cases. Any missed exam counts as a 0 unless the student has a valid documented excuse and contacts me as soon as possible after the excuse for missing the test arises. Examples of valid documented excuses are sickness documented with a doctor's note, death in the family documented with a copy of the death notice, attending university-sponsored events with a Dean's excuse, etc. Minor headaches or attending sports events (without Dean's excuse) are not examples of emergency situations.

Final Exam:

In order to pass this class, students must take the final exam on December 8, 10:00 am – 11:50 am. The exam will cover topics from throughout the semester. Final exams cannot be rescheduled or missed (for dire and unforeseen medical or family emergencies, students must consult with me). Missing the final exam will result in a grade of F in the course.

Class Policies and Expectations

The following policies and expectations have been established for this course to create a productive learning atmosphere for all students. Please bring any concerns you may have to my attention.

1. Students are expected to arrive and be ready to start class on time and stay for the entire class period. Please refrain from leaving during class or packing up belongings early. If you know ahead of time that you will need to leave class early, please inform me before class. If you need to leave suddenly during class, please follow up with me by email after class.
2. Students are expected to participate in discussions, in-class exercises, quizzes and problem presentations. During lectures, class discussions, or group discussions, students should give their attention to the speaker(s) and contribute to the conversation. Students can earn up to 5 points (added to exam scores) based on their level of participation.
3. The use of phones or other electronic devices for non-class related activities is not allowed. Students may use laptops or tablets for note-taking and may also use assistive technology and record, but not as a substitute for note-taking. If a student needs to remain in phone contact with others outside of the classroom due to an ongoing situation, please notify me in advance. Please step outside the classroom to take phone calls or send messages.
4. Please refrain from bringing food or drinks to class. If needed, water or small snacks are permitted as long as they are not a distraction (not noisy, fragrant, messy, etc.).

Students unable to follow these policies will be referred to the Dean of Students and/or asked to drop the class.

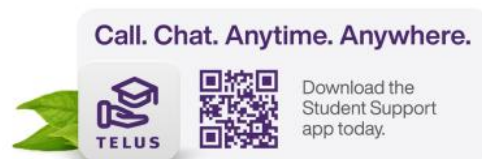

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance

According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance.
