Course Description

This online seminar course covers a unique area of clinical psychology. It focuses on providing behavioral health and consultative services to the military. Topics include military history, culture, and clinical issues like PTSD and combat stress. We'll also cover the roles of military psychologists and ethical concerns. This course will be in a seminar format, so be ready to discuss each topic in every class.

Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

1. Identify and describe major historical and emerging topics in military psychology
2. Understand main trends in knowledge and research that relate to military psychology
3. Explain the roles and responsibilities of military psychologists



Grading

This course is based on a total of 290 pts. Below is a breakdown of the various assignments and how many points each assignment is worth.

1) Tests: Three tests and a final exam will be given in this course. The exams will have multiple choice, True/False, and short answer questions. Each of the three tests is worth 36 points. The final exam is also 36 points, making a total of 144 points. Students ****must take**** the exams on Blackboard ****by the due date.**** Tests are available from Thursday at midnight. You can finish them until the next Monday at 11:59 PM. **So, there are no “makeup” tests.** If you miss an exam, you will earn a zero (0). PLEASE PUT TEST DATES ON YOUR CALENDAR NOW.**

2) Writing Assignments: Students are required to write one APA formatted paper. The written assignment is worth 50pts. A description of the assignment is located at the end of the syllabus. It is important to be familiar with APA writing style. The paper is due by **11:59 CST** on the assigned date. Late assignments will be accepted up to 2 days late but will experience a **25% deduction for each day late.**

3) Presentations: Students will be responsible for creating a presentation to include speaker notes (with power point slides) that is worth 44pts. A description of the assignment is located at the end of the syllabus. Presentations are due by **11:59 CST** on the assigned date. Late presentations will be accepted up to 2 days late but will experience a **25% deduction for each day late.**

4) Discussion Boards: Active participation is important in an on-line course. To encourage participation, each student can earn 4 points. This happens every week a discussion question is posted on Black Board. A total of 13 discussion questions will be presented. Each student needs to make an original post. Then, respond to two classmates’ posts to get credit. Post your original contributions to the weekly group discussion forum by 11:59 PM CST every Wednesday. Please respond to at least two peers by 11:59 PM CST every Friday. Late posts won’t earn credit. You can earn a total of 56 points.

Posts must directly reference the week's readings, media, lessons, and content. You need to provide citations and references. Each post must be original and clearly relate to the week's topic. The three posts should include one original post and two responses to students. Each post needs to be 1 to 2 paragraphs long. Each paragraph should have at least six sentences.

Submit discussion board posts through the Blackboard assignment manager. You can find this by clicking the assignments button in the course navigation menu. Make sure to submit by the specified date and time. Discussions posts submitted after due date will not receive full credit.

Please Note: No use of Generative AI Permitted

PSYC 3344 expects all work submitted by students to be their own. Students can work alone or in groups. Students must write their own assignments. This means they shouldn't hire someone or use services to do it. Using AI tools like ChatGPT for writing is not allowed. Any

Written Assignment

****Prepare**** a 1,050- to 1,200-word paper. In it, describe two clinical issues, like suicide, substance abuse, PTSD, or the divorce rate. Then, suggest possible solutions to help reduce or resolve these issues.

Address the following:

- Identify two clinical issues and describe them in detail
- Propose solutions to the identified issues. Explain how your solutions could help resolve or reduce the clinical challenges.

Format your paper consistent with APA guidelines. Include at least **5 references** in your paper. Three of the references should come from peer reviewed journals.

Presentations

Review the material we have covered in class. Students will select a military psychology topic of interest. Choose a topic that's different from the one you picked for the writing assignment. **Prepare** a 16-Microsoft® PowerPoint® slide presentation in which you examine the selected topic. Make sure you fully cover the topic and provide examples where appropriate. Your presentation **MUST** include detailed speaker notes for each slide. Prepare the notes as a transcript. When discussing each slide in your presentation, write down what you would say. You can add these notes at the bottom of each slide in the "add notes" section. **In order for a student to receive full credit, he or she must INCLUDE the SPEAKER NOTES with the slide deck. Make sure you include a minimum of 5 references with the presentation. Three of the references should come from peer reviewed journals. **Place the reference list in APA format on the last slide of your presentation.****
