Course Description

ENGL 1301 supports students in their belonging as writers. The course validates and celebrates students' languaging while introducing concepts and practices essential for success in writing. Students examine and explore their language practices and develop a digital writing portfolio.

Major Course Requirements

Reading Notes

For each reading assignment, students will take notes, highlight, and write down their comments, questions, and thoughts for use in discussion. Reading Responses will be due at the start of each class session.

Project One: How Do I Belong?

Students will engage with the question "How Do I Belong?" by exploring on-campus events, opportunities, and resources that might be helpful to them as a student and bring back that information to share with their classmates.

Project Two: How Do You Language?

Students will pick the language that they "speak" that is most important to them and to explore it through the medium of their choosing: a traditional essay, a PowerPoint presentation, a video, a song or poem, a podcast, etc.

Writer's Portfolio

Students will use Digication to compose a digital writing portfolio to show their audience who they are as a writer.
