ABA 5309 Behaviorism

A. MAJOR COURSE DESCRIPTION/REQUIREMENT

This course discusses the philosophy that provides the basis for ABA and the experimental analysis of behavior; this philosophy is known as radical behaviorism. Students will learn about the philosophical underpinnings of behavior analysis as demonstrated through the BACB® 5th edition task list. ABA 5301 Concepts and Principles of ABA is a prerequisite for this course.
