Prerequisites:

Admitted into the College of Business, with a grade of "C" or better in ACCT 3302. Students who do not meet the pre-requisites must contact the instructor immediately.

Catalog Course Description:

This course builds upon the concepts learned in ACCT 3302 Intermediate Accounting I providing an in depth understanding of the source and use of authoritative accounting standards. The course provides an exhaustive study of the accounting for revenue recognition and assets, with special emphasis on cash, accounts receivables, inventories, PP&E, and intangible assets. The course also covers changes in accounting principles/estimates, error corrections, and topics such as accounting standards codification and earnings management.

Course Objectives:

Intermediate Accounting is the foundation for all your accounting studies. The objective of this course is to provide prospective users of financial statements with a thorough understanding of the accounting fundamentals as effective financing and investment decision-makers. The course provides students with a solid grasp of the assumptions and logic inherent in accounting techniques, their implications and their potential economic consequences. <u>A critical attitude is encouraged throughout</u> the course.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of the course, students are expected to:

Build on introductory knowledge of financial accounting concepts and statements.

- Analyze more complex business transactions and how these transactions are included in a firm's accounting information system.
- Develop students' ability to interpret financial accounting information on assets and income for decision making.

Required Materials:

- **Textbook:** *Intermediate Accounting* by Spiceland, Nelson and Thomas, **11th edition** (published by McGraw-Hill)

Artificial Intelligence (AI) Policy:

This course assumes that all work submitted by students will be generated by the students themselves, working individually or in groups. Students should not have another person/entity do the writing of any portion of an assignment for them, which includes using artificial intelligence (AI) tools like ChatGPT.

I will communicate any clarifications, changes and/or additions during class or using announcements via **Blackboard**. Students should monitor this several times a day. Course requirements every student must fulfill in order to succeed in this course:

- 1. The course is intensive and challenging and <u>you are expected to **take an active role in your own** <u>**learning.**</u> The structure of the class makes your individual study and preparation outside the class extremely important.</u>
- 2. Students should remember that **hybrid courses** assume **greater** responsibility and independent learning skills by the student for their own learning outcomes.
- 3. There are online units of learning posted to Blackboard. Students MUST complete the assigned course requirements on Blackboard and will be held accountable for all materials posted on Blackboard.

- 4. Ensure to set up expectation of time for this course. Change based on your course needs. You are expected to spend **3-6 hours per week** for the course. Based on the background, some students may need more time. Time spent may be longer when assignment/exams are due.
- 5. Do not delay. Plan on being successful by beginning your study NOW. The instructor will not be revising the grading systems based on anyone's initial poor performance.
- 6. Students should check the Course Calendar, Announcements, and Messages (e-mail) systems in Blackboard on a regular basis.
- 7. Students should keep current with all course assignments, quizzes, and examinations.
- 8. Students should ask questions and communicate with the instructor either in class, online, off-line or during office hours.

How to Be Successful in This Course:

In any course, a reliable structure to guide your learning of content is essential. Each week will follow the same basic format:

- <u>Before class</u>: You should read the corresponding pages in the book prior to class. We'll move at a quick pace during class so having some background knowledge will be helpful to understanding the lecture.
- <u>During class</u>: You should come to class ready to actively engage in learning the material. I can help to synthesize the material, point out the key concepts, and help structure your thinking. Students generally learn far more in less time during our class sessions than they do on their own.
- <u>After class</u>: You will complete the assigned homework. Be sure to take advantage of Hint videos that are available with many assignments, and visit office hours that are available each week if needed. The lecture video from our live class session will be posted to Blackboard for you to review.

Most of all, if at any time you think there is something more that I can do to help you, please don't hesitate to ask. I want you to enjoy the course, do the best you can, learn as much as you can, and understand the importance of accounting.

Grading Policy:

The final course grade will be based on your performance on the quizzes, exams, assignments and class participation using the following weights:

The final letter grades will be assigned as follows: Above 90% \Rightarrow A; 80 – 89.99% \Rightarrow B; 70 – 79.99% \Rightarrow C; 60 – 69.99% \Rightarrow D; below 60% \Rightarrow F. **There will be no grading on a curve.**

This course has a requirement of a grade of C as a minimal grade for satisfactory completion of this course. If a student is found deficient in this course, the student must retake the course until the required minimum grade is achieved.

Class Attendance and Participation:

A vital part of every student's education is regular attendance of class meetings (for face-toface/hybrid classes/online synchronous classes). You are expected to attend and participate in all class meetings. Excessive absences will negatively affect your course grade. Students are strongly encouraged to ask questions in class, participate in class discussions and problem solving, and visit/contact the instructor during office hours in case of questions or concerns. Good attendance and participation will be rewarded when final grades are assigned.

HW Assignments:

The best way to learn is to *do* accounting. Learning accounting takes a great deal of practice. Accordingly, homework is assigned for topics covered in the class. Students should work on the homework assignments on their own. <u>Some of the exam and quiz questions will be similar to the homework questions and examples in the lecture slides.</u> Individual assignments and due dates will be posted through McGraw-Hill Connect and Blackboard. Be sure to take advantage of Hint videos that are available with many assignments, and visit office hours that are available each week if needed. You can judge your development in the course by noting how well you understand the homework.

Examinations and Quizzes:

There will be 6 quizzes and two exams during the semester. The exam/quiz will consist of conceptual multiple-choice questions, problem solving questions, and journal entries questions. The exam/quiz materials will come from lecture notes, homework assignments, and class discussions. Questions will emphasize understanding and applications of concepts and topics covered in class. Additional exam and quiz details will be provided prior to the test dates.

Make up and Late Exam/Quiz policy:

<u>As a general rule, make-ups or late submissions will **NOT** be offered or accepted for any missed exams/assignments/quizzes. Late submissions or make-ups may be accepted/administered only in extraordinary circumstances such as an excused official university activity, a severe illness, or a dire emergency. However, you must provide comprehensive documentation either before or within a few days of the missed assignment/quiz/exam.</u>

Term Project:

The objective of the project is to stimulate your **critical thinking**, get experience studying the financial reports of publicly traded U.S. companies, and enable you to apply the concepts studied during the semester in ACCT 3303.

Class Conduct and Civility Code:

Everyone in class is expected to follow all rules in the student handbook, as well as common courtesy during classroom lectures and discussions in class and online, including the following:

1. Attendance may be made at the beginning or the end of the class.

- 2. Students must retain copies of all assignments and graded work for verification purposes and provide it to the instructor, if necessary. Keep your own copies of all computer files and e-mails till the final grade is received.
- 3. Talking while the instructor is lecturing is extremely disruptive and discourteous to the instructor and other students.
- 4. Using computers or phones (except for a valid urgent need) during class for a purpose not related to class is disruptive. All cell phones and gadgets should be turned OFF and headphones removed.
- 5. For any questions about the exams and quizzes, a student should contact the instructor well in advance of the day they are due, so the instructor may have enough time to provide feedback.
- 6. All communications will be via e-mail communications to the Texas A&M University e-mail account, and students are expected to use their school provided email account. The instructor will reply to a student e-mail messages within 2 business days (Monday-Friday).

Anyone violating these policies may be subject to disciplinary actions.

You may drop the course with an automatic grade of W on or before the date listed in the academic calendar at <u>www.tamusa.edu</u>.
