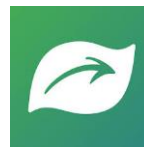

Catalog Description and Prerequisites:

1307. General Biology II – Biology of Organisms. 3 (3-0)

This course provides an overview of the diversity of life,

the evolutionary relationships among major groups of organisms, and the structural/functional characteristics of these organisms. Topics emphasized will include the study of life at the organismal, population, and community level including form, function, reproduction, taxonomy, systematics, ecology and evolutionary history of biodiversity. This course is designed for students majoring in science fields. This course meets the standards for the Life and Physical Sciences category of courses under the core curriculum. Students majoring or minoring in Biology cannot use placement exams (e.g. CLEP) to fulfill this course requirement. Students whose degree program has this course as a listed requirement must earn a 'C' to be considered passing.

Prerequisite: A passing grade of 'C' or better in BIOL 1306 and BIOL 1106. Co-requisite for students majoring or minoring in biology: BIOL 1107 – General Biology II Laboratory.

Learning Objectives:

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

1. Students will develop critical thinking skills, communication skills, and Empirical and Quantitative skills. Students will learn to work as a team.
2. Student will gain an appreciation for the diversity of life on Earth.
3. Students will be able to compare and contrast how different organisms carry out similar life functions.
4. Students will understand what homologous structures are.
5. Students will be able to interpret basic cladograms that show evolutionary relatedness
6. Students will understand the basic principles of evolution.
7. Students will understand the basic principles of population, community, and ecosystem ecology. Students will also be able to evaluate if a scientific question is best answered via experiments at the population, community, or ecosystem level.
8. Student will be able to critically assess content and illustrate its broader meaning to the public.

Grading and Methods of Assessment:

The student will be able to answer correctly at least 70% of the questions on scheduled exams, homework and quizzes. Lecture exams and quizzes may consist of true or false, multiple choice, fill in the blank, matching, and short essay questions. All assessments are based on 100 points.

Throughout the semester you will be informed of your grade standing. Grades will be posted on Blackboard.

I will consider scaling up from a B to an A if you have earned an **89.7 and** you have great attendance.
I will *not* scale up from a B to an A (regardless of your attendance) if you have earned an 89.1%, that is a B through and through.

1. Competencies will be demonstrated on homework, quizzes, activities/projects, and exams. Exams may have a combination of essay, listing, matching, multiple choice, fill-in-the-blank and true/false questions. All types may not be included on each exam.
2. A student must master 70% of the competencies in order to receive credit for the course. A student demonstrating 90% or more knowledge of all competencies will receive an A in the course.
3. All **Connect homework and quiz submissions will be online.** There will be several activities that are conducted during class time and/or outside with either in-class and/or online submissions.
4. All **exams will be Face-to-Face during scheduled class time.** Please see the syllabus schedule.
5. All exams and assignments will be graded on a point system.
6. All exams and assignments are scheduled on the tentative syllabus schedule and Blackboard Calendar.
7. You may turn assignments in ahead of the deadline, but if you miss the deadline, your assignment will be assigned a **zero**.



8. There is the potential for extra credit opportunities for this class. These will be announced during class time so be sure to attend class regular because not all can be made up.

****HINTS FOR SUCCESS.** Complete assignments and submit them in on time. Do not wait until the night before to study for exam or complete assignment. All assessments are provided with plenty of completion time.

Lecture Exams (Face-to-Face):

1. You will be given **four (4) Lecture Exams** & a **Cumulative Final Exam**.
2. Your Lecture Exams will consist of approximately 40-50 questions in the format stated in Grading Scheme #1 above. Exams 1 & 2 are worth 100 points each. Exams 3 & 4 are worth 75 points each (mini-exams).
 - Exams will be **given during the scheduled class time**; Feedback will be limited and provided during office hours or by appointment.
 - Exams must be taken on the scheduled class date/time in syllabus & Blackboard.
3. Your Cumulative Final Exam contains material from the entire semester. This exam must be taken (it cannot be dropped or replaced).
 - Your final exam will be in a format similar to your lecture exams.
 - Your final exam will consist of 100 questions and worth 200 points.
 - Final Exam must be taken by the due date in the syllabus and University Final Exam Calendar and Blackboard during the scheduled time.
4. Exams must be taken when scheduled.
 - You may make up an exam **only if**
 - you contact me within **one day (24-hours)** of the scheduled exam
 - your absence is one approved by college policies (illness, death in the family, other immediate-family emergencies). **Documentation will be required.**
 - Again – **if I do not hear from you within 24 hours of the scheduled exam, you have forfeited the right to make up the exam.**

Connect Homework (online):

- **One (1)** out of the **nine (9)** Connect homeworks will be dropped and the remaining **eight (8)** will be included for this portion of your course grade.
- Each chapter(s) will have a set of Homework Questions. You will have 2 attempts to answer these questions and each attempt will have an unlimited time frame so you will have plenty of time to read the textbook in order to find the answers. This is the only assessment in which I highly encourage you to find the answers to the questions in your textbook.
- All Connect homework assignments will be available beginning the first day of the course unit so you may work ahead; however, each one has a Due Date corresponding with the exam schedule, so complete these first, and then use them to study for your quizzes and exams.
- Chapter Homework assignments cannot be made up.

Connect Quizzes (online):

- You will complete a series of Quizzes (a group of chapters included on an exam) covering the material from the chapters you will study this semester.



- All quizzes will be available beginning the first day of the course unit; however, each quiz is timed (30 minutes for 20 questions) with 2 attempts; therefore, it is recommended to complete the corresponding homework(s) first then take the quiz for each exam.
- **One (1)** out of the **seven (7)** quizzes will be dropped and the remaining 6 quizzes will be included for this portion of your course grade.
- Quizzes will cover the main ideas for each exam.
- Quizzes cannot be made up.

Tour of Texas Ecology Portfolio Presentation (Group Effort worth 50 points)

- All semester you will be working in a group of approximately 3-4 team members. Each group will be researching a local biome, invasive species, and animal group/phyla that will be presented during the last week of classes in place of an animal diversity exam.
- Group worksheets will be provided throughout the semester to 'kick-start' the research process as well as use for lecture exam reviews. These worksheets will be graded and included as part of The Environment and You Assignments category (see below section).
- A presentation grading rubric and more details will be provided during Unit 3. *The goal of this activity is to begin applying the general biology concepts that you are learning about to your own personal environment.*

The Environment and You Assignments (7 out of 8):

1. Class Assignments (varies online & face-to-face):

- Throughout the semester, you will complete a series of hands-on activities corresponding with course topics. Additional details will be provided on Blackboard and during class time. **Therefore, please come to class because each assignment type is different!**
- Class assignments have corresponding due dates & cannot be made up. Please see tentative schedule. **Therefore, please come to class! Not all assignments can be made up or may be conducted only during class time.**
- ****Some activities are conducted outside with online submissions; therefore, please plan accordingly regarding weather and time management.****

2. Seek by iNaturalist (free app!)

- You will become familiar with a few tools/apps the public has access to learn about the organisms all around you. These tools are part of a field called Citizen Science that biologists can use to help gather various types of data.
- There will be several (3) small assignments that will use the Seek by iNaturalist tool that you will work on throughout the semester. **Assignment details are provided on Blackboard and during class time and each has an associated due date!**

3. Scientific Article Reviews

- You will be encouraged to become habitual readers of newspapers and magazines, focusing on articles related to current environmental issues/topics. Throughout the semester and corresponding with each course unit (time between exams), you will conduct an article review on



different environmental issues/topics that we discuss **during the current course unit.**

- There will be a total **four (4)** article reviews for this portion of your grade.
- You will submit via Blackboard a short review about the current environmental issue/topic that you learned about in a scientific journal, magazine, newspaper, or the Internet (No blogs or social media). **The topic MUST be associated with the current unit!**
- Type two paragraphs, ~ ½ - 1 page, 12 pt. font, standard margins and line spacing. In the first paragraph, summarize the article and in the second paragraph, summarize your reaction and opinion of the article. Source of the article must be cited (APA format). **The submitted file must be in PDF or Word format (compatible with Blackboard) to receive credit.** *Additional details, requirements, and grading rubric is found in Blackboard.*

Attendance / Participation:

This is a face-to-face course; therefore, actually coming to class is important. I will randomly take attendance during some lecture days, which can consist of roll call, activity participation, question of the day submissions, etc. Therefore, if you miss class and attendance is taken, you have forfeited your attendance points for that day unless you provide a university-excused absence documentation (per the syllabus). **Attendance is worth 50 points,** which *will be awarded on the first attendance day and will be deducted afterwards, if applicable.*

Makeup Policies:

Due to the nature of this course and the fact that exams, quizzes, and homework/assignments are given plenty notice and/or are open for more than one week, make-up opportunities will only be allowed for:

- a. Hospitalization (evidence required),
- b. Hospitalization of an immediate family for which you are the primary caretaker (evidence required), or
- c. Incapacitating illness, such as COVID (evidence required).

If any of the above have prevented you turning in exams, quizzes, or assignment by the due date, you must contact me within 24 hours of the due date. **Due dates for anything assigned will be strictly enforced.**

Blackboard and Course Communication

All grades and assignments will be posted and accessible through the course's Blackboard site. Students must log-in regularly to both the Blackboard site and to their TAMU-SA email account to keep updated on information related to the class. Each student MUST have an active TAMU-SA email account. This will be the email address that is used for any communication between me and you. Students who e-mail me Monday-Thursday ordinarily can expect a response within 48 hours. Students who e-mail Friday-Sunday ordinarily can expect a response by 9:00 PM on Monday.

Use of Generative AI Permitted Under Some Circumstances or With Explicit Permission

There are situations and contexts within this course where you may be asked to use artificial intelligence (AI) tools to explore how they can be used. Outside of those circumstances, you should not use AI tools to generate content (text, video, audio, images) that will end up in any student work (assignments, activities, discussion responses, etc.) that is part of your evaluation in this course. Any student work submitted using AI tools should clearly indicate with attribution what work is the student's work and what part is generated by the AI. In such cases, no more than 25% of the student work should be generated by AI. If any part of this is confusing or uncertain, students should reach out to their instructor for clarification before submitting work for grading. Use of AI-generated content without the instructor's permission and/or proper attribution in this



course qualifies as academic dishonesty and violates Texas A&M-San Antonio's standards of academic integrity.

STUDENT OBLIGATIONS

1. **Attendance:** Regular and punctual attendance in all classes and laboratories, day and evening, is required. Students who are absent for any reason should always consult with their instructors prior to absence (if possible). Both tardiness and early departure from class may be considered forms of absenteeism. A student may be dropped if there are excessive absences. 2. **Students will need to check their emails daily in case of changes or updates to the class.**
3. A student absent for the equivalence of **2 weeks** of classes may be automatically dropped from the course with a "W".
4. The instructor will only withdraw students for nonattendance until the official Withdrawal Date. Students who have not withdrawn themselves or requested withdrawal by the instructor, and stop attending class after this date will receive a performance grade (A/B/C/D/F).
5. It is not the instructor's responsibility to provide a student with any notes, assignments, or reviews missed due to student absence. All materials may be obtained by contacting the instructor during office hours, getting with a classmate, and/or downloaded from your Blackboard course. All material for the course is located on Blackboard.
6. **Email Etiquette:** Professional email etiquette is a requirement when communicating with me (or anyone) online. A proper greeting (e.g. Mrs. Korzekwa, Professor Korzekwa, Hello Mrs. Korzekwa, etc.) with a coherent message needs to be included with every email sent to me. **Emails that do not satisfy these conditions will be ignored. *Please do not write emails as you would text or include the entire email body in the subject heading, and please be respectful to all.***
7. **Assessments:** All chapter homework, quizzes, and assignments are due Sunday by midnight on the Blackboard website. You are encouraged to get ahead on assignments. Once the deadline has passed, your score will be zero with no make-up opportunity if it has not been completed, unless your instructor states differently. Blackboard will have a calendar displaying when all assignments and exams are due. It is the student's responsibility to frequently check this calendar. Finally, it is up to the student to have a **stable internet/browser connection** when conducting online assignments. Feel free to utilize the campus or contact IT for assistance.
8. **Grades:** All grades are final at the end of the semester. If there is an issue, please make an appointment with me and be prepared to defend your case (i.e. bring ALL assignments, etc.).
9. **Studying Tips:** In college, it is expected that for every credit hour you spend in class, you spend 3 hours working on that material at home. Thus, in the class, it is expected that in addition to coming to class, you also spend 9 hours a week on outside work pertaining to this class. This of course takes time-management skills. **Please take this into consideration when planning your semester activities.**
10. **Laptops and Cell Phones:** If you are going to use your laptop for taking notes, please sit in the back row as research has shown computers disrupt others around and behind you. If I catch you doing something other than taking notes on your computer, you will be asked to leave. ALL cell phones must be placed on silent or off and put away during class time. If you are caught using a cell phone then you will be marked absent and possibly asked to leave the class. Please inform me prior to class if you are expecting an emergency notification. ***Since some assessments are online, you are HIGHLY encouraged to work off of a computer or laptop with audio/microphone. Please coordinate with IT**



and feel free to use the campus resources such as computer labs, as needed.

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance: According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. Meeting Basic Needs: Any student who has difficulty affording groceries or accessing sufficient food to eat every day, or who lacks a safe and stable place to live, and believes this may affect their performance in the course, is urged to contact the Dean of Students (DOS@tamusa.edu) for support. Furthermore, please notify the professor if you are comfortable in doing so. This will enable them to provide any resources they may possess.

Military Affairs: Veterans and active-duty military personnel are welcomed and encouraged to communicate, in advance if possible, and special circumstances (e.g., upcoming deployment, drill requirements, disability accommodations). You are also encouraged to visit the Patriots' Casa in-person room 202, or to contact the Office of Military Affairs with any questions at military@tamusa.edu or (210)784-1397.

Religious Observances: Texas A&M University-San Antonio recognizes the diversity of faiths represented among the campus community and protects the rights of students, faculty, and staff to observe religious holidays according to their tradition. Under the policy, students are provided an opportunity to make up any examination, study, or work requirements that may be missed due to a religious observance provided they notify their instructors before the end of the second week of classes for regular session classes.

Respect for Diversity: We understand that our students represent diverse backgrounds and perspectives. When we are equity-minded, we are aware of differences and inequalities and are willing to discuss them so we can act to resolve them. - Keep confidential discussions that the community has of a personal (or professional) nature.
- Use this opportunity together to discuss ways in which we can create an inclusive environment in this course and across the A&M-San Antonio community.

The Six-Drop Rule: Students are subject to the requirements of Senate Bill (SB) 1231 passed by the Texas Legislature in 2007. SB 1231 limits students to a maximum of six (6) non-punitive course drops (i.e., courses a student chooses to drop) during their undergraduate careers. A non-punitive drop does not affect the student's GPA. However, course drops that exceed the maximum allowed by SB 1231 will be treated as "F" grades and will impact the student's GPA.

Statement of Harassment and Discrimination: Texas A&M University-San Antonio is committed to the fundamental principles of academic freedom, equality of opportunity and human dignity. Students' Rights and Responsibilities: The following statement of students' rights and responsibilities is intended to reflect the philosophical base upon which University Student Rules are built. This philosophy acknowledges the existence of both rights and responsibilities, which is inherent to an individual not only as a student at Texas A&M University-San Antonio but also as a citizen of this country.

Students' Rights

1. A student shall have the right to participate in a free exchange of ideas, and there shall be no University rule or administrative rule that in any way abridges the rights of freedom of speech, expression, petition and peaceful assembly as set forth in the U.S. Constitution.
2. Each student shall have the right to participate in all areas and activities of the University, free from any form of discrimination, including harassment, on the basis of race, color, national or ethnic origin, religion, sex, disability, age, sexual orientation, or veteran status in accordance with applicable federal and state laws.
3. A student has the right to personal privacy except as otherwise provided by law, and this will be observed by students and University authorities alike.
4. Each student subject to disciplinary action arising from violations of university student rules shall be assured a fundamentally fair process.

Students' Responsibilities

1. A student has the responsibility to respect the rights and property of others, including other students, the faculty and administration.



2. A student has the responsibility to be fully acquainted with the published University Student Rules found in the Student Handbook, [Student Code of Conduct](#), on our website, University Catalog and to comply with them, as well as federal, state, and local laws.
3. A student has the responsibility to recognize that student actions reflect upon the individuals involved and upon the entire University community.
4. A student has the responsibility to recognize the University's obligation to provide an environment for learning.
5. A student has the responsibility to check their university email for any updates or official university notification.

We expect that students will behave in a manner that is dignified, respectful, and courteous to all people, regardless of sex, ethnic/racial origin, religious background, sexual orientation or disability. Behaviors that infringe on the rights of another individual will not be tolerated. Students are expected to exhibit a high level of honesty and integrity in their pursuit of higher education. Students engaging in an act that violates the standards of academic integrity will find themselves facing academic and/or disciplinary sanctions. Academic misconduct is any act, or attempt, which gives an unfair advantage to the student. Additionally, any behavior specifically prohibited by a faculty member in the course syllabus or class discussion may be considered as academic misconduct.
