COURSE DESCRIPTION

Students examine the principles of organismal biology, biodiversity and ecology in the modern world and how these principles relate to issue in today's society and their broader meaning to the public. Topics in this course include the study of life at the organismal level considering their morphology, life histories, physiology and ecology. The nature and evolution of biological diversity and how that diversity is studied is included.



Laboratory-based exercises are included. This course meets the standards for the Life and Physical Sciences category of courses under the core curriculum.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Upon successful completion of this course, student will

- 1. Develop critical thinking skills, communication skills, and empirical and quantitative skills through working as a team.
- 2. Gain an appreciation for the diversity of life on Earth.
- 3. Describe modern evolutionary synthesis, natural selection, population genetics, micro and macroevolution, and speciation.
- 4. Describe phylogenetic relationships and classification schemes.
- 5. Identify the major phyla of life with an emphasis on plants and animals, including the basis for classification, structural and physiological adaptations, evolutionary history, and ecological significance.
- 6. Compare and contrast how different organisms carry out similar life functions.
- 7. Illustrate the relationship between major geologic change, extinctions, and evolutionary trends.
- 8. Understand the basic principles of population, community, and ecosystem ecology.
- 9. Evaluate if an ecological question is best answered via experiments at the population, community, or ecosystem level.
- 10. Apply scientific reasoning to investigate questions and utilize scientific tools such as microscopes and laboratory equipment to collect and analyze data.
- 11. Use critical thinking and scientific problem-solving to make informed decisions in the laboratory or field.
- 12. Critically assess content and illustrate its broader meaning to the public.

- 1. Competencies will be demonstrated on homework, quizzes, activities/projects, and exams. Exams may have a combination of essay, listing, matching, multiple choice, and true/false questions. All types may not be included on each exam.
- 2. A student must master 70% of the competencies in order to receive credit for the course. A student demonstrating 90% or more knowledge of all competencies will receive an A in the course.
- 3. <u>All Connect homework and quiz</u> submissions will be <u>online</u>. There will be several activities that are <u>conducted during class time and/or outside with either in-class and/or online submissions.</u>
- 4. All **exams** will be **face-to-face** during scheduled class time.
- 5. All exams and assignments will be graded on a point system.
- 6. All exams and assignments are scheduled on the tentative syllabus schedule and Blackboard Calendar.
- 7. You may turn assignments in ahead of the deadline, <u>but if you miss the deadline</u>, <u>your assignment will be</u> assigned a **zero**. **I DO NOT ACCEPT LATE WORK.**
- 8. There is the potential for extra credit opportunities for this class. These will be announced during class time so be sure to attend class regular because not all can be made up.

**HINTS FOR SUCCESS. Complete assignments and submit them in on time. <u>Do not wait until the night before</u> to study for exam or complete assignment. <u>All assessments are provided with plenty of completion time</u>.

Lecture Exams & Group Presentation (Face-to-Face):

- 1. You will be given **four (4)** Lecture Exams.
- 2. Your <u>Lecture Exams</u> will consist of approximately 40-50 questions in the format stated in Grading Scheme #1 above. <u>Exams 1 & 2 are worth 100 points each</u>. <u>Exam 3 is worth 70 points & Exam 4 is worth 80 points each</u> (mini-exams).
 - Exams will be given during the scheduled class time; Feedback will be limited and provided during office hours or by appointment.
 - Exams <u>must be taken</u> on the <u>scheduled class date/time</u> in syllabus & Blackboard.

3. Animal Group Dating Profile Presentation (Group Effort worth 50 points)

- All semester you will be working in a group of approximately 3-4 team members on various activities.
 At the end of the semester in lieu of an animal diversity/comparative anatomy lecture exam, each group will research an animal group/phyla that will be presented on the last day of class (see schedule below).
- A presentation grading rubric and more details will be provided during Unit 4. The goal of this activity is to begin <u>applying the general biology concepts</u> that you are learning about to <u>your own personal</u> environment as well as showcasing students' creativity skills.
- 4. Exams & the Group Presentation <u>must be taken/conducted</u> when scheduled.
 - You may make up an exam only if
 - you contact me within <u>one day (24-hours)</u> of the scheduled exam
 - your absence is one approved by college policies (illness, death in the family, other immediate-family emergencies). Documentation will be required.
 - Again if I do not hear from you within 24 hours of the scheduled exam, you have forfeited the right to make up the exam.

Connect Homework (online):

- <u>Two</u> (2) out of the <u>twelve</u> (12) Connect homework assignments will be dropped and the remaining <u>ten</u> (10) will be included for this portion of your course grade.
- Each chapter(s) will have a set of Homework Questions. You will have 2 attempts to answer these questions and each attempt will have an unlimited time frame so you will have plenty of time to read the textbook in order to find the answers. This is the only assessment in which I highly encourage you to find the answers to the questions in your textbook.
- All Connect Homework assignments will be available beginning the first day of the course unit so you
 may work ahead; however, each one has a Due Date corresponding with the exam schedule, so
 complete these first, and then use them to study for your quizzes and exams.
- Connect Homework assignments <u>cannot</u> be made up.

Connect Quizzes (online):

- You will complete a series of <u>6</u> Connect Quizzes covering the material from the chapters you will study this semester. <u>I will drop your lowest Connect Quiz grade</u>.
- All Connect quizzes will be available beginning the first day of the course unit; however, <u>each quiz is</u> <u>timed (20 minutes for 20 questions with 2 attempts)</u>; therefore, it is recommended to complete the corresponding homework(s) first then take the quiz for each exam.
- Quizzes will cover the main ideas for each exam.
- Connect Quizzes cannot be made up.



The Environment and You Assignments ($\underline{11}$ out of $\underline{12}$):

1. Class Assignments (<u>varies online & face-to-face</u>):

- Throughout the semester, you will complete a series of hands-on activities corresponding with course topics. Additional details will be provided on Blackboard and during class time.
 Therefore, please come to class because each assignment type is different!
- Class assignments have corresponding due dates & <u>cannot</u> be made up. Please see tentative schedule. <u>Therefore, please come to class! Not all assignments can be made up or may be conducted only during class time.</u>
- **Some activities are conducted outside with online submissions; therefore, please plan accordingly regarding weather and time management.**

2. Seek by iNaturalist (free app!)

- You will becoming familiar with a few tools/apps the public has access to learn about the organisms all around you. These tools are part of a field called Citizen Science that biologists can use to help gather various types of data.
- There will be several small assignments that will use the Seek by iNaturalist tool that you will work on throughout the semester. <u>Assignment details are provided on Blackboard and during class time and each has an associated due date!</u> The goal of this activity is to begin <u>applying the general biology concepts</u> that you are learning about to <u>your own personal environment</u>.

3. Scientific Article Reviews

- You will be encouraged to become habitual readers of newspapers and magazines, focusing on articles related to current environmental issues/topics. Throughout the semester and <u>corresponding with each course unit</u> (time between exams), you will conduct an article review on different environmental issues/topics that we discuss <u>during the current course unit</u>.
 - There will be a total **five (5)** article reviews for this portion of your grade.
 - You will <u>submit via Blackboard</u> a short review about the current environmental issue/topic that you learned about in a scientific journal, magazine, newspaper, or the Internet (No blogs or social media). <u>The topic MUST be associated with the current unit!</u>
 - Type two paragraphs, ~ ½ 1 page, 12 pt. font, standard margins and line spacing. In the first paragraph, summarize the article and in the second paragraph, summarize your reaction and opinion of the article. Source of the article <u>must be cited (APA format)</u>. The <u>submitted file must be in PDF or Word format (compatible with Blackboard) to receive credit</u>. Additional details, requirements, and grading rubric is found in Blackboard.

Attendance / Participation:

This is a face-to-face course; therefore, actually coming to class is important. I will randomly take attendance during some lecture days, which can consist of roll call, activity participation, question of the day submissions, etc. Therefore, if you miss class and attendance is taken, you have forfeited your attendance points for that day unless you provide a university-excused absence documentation (per the syllabus). Attendance is worth 90 points, which will be awarded on the first attendance day and will be deducted afterwards, if applicable.

Makeup Policies:

Due to the nature of this course and the fact that exams, quizzes, and homework/assignments are given plenty notice and/or are open for more than one day, make-up opportunities will only be allowed for:

Use of Generative AI Permitted Under Some Circumstances or With Explicit Permission

There are situations and contexts within this course where you may be asked to use artificial intelligence (AI) tools to explore how they can be used. STUDENT OBLIGATIONS

1. Attendance: Regular and punctual attendance in all classes and laboratories, day and evening, is required. Students who are absent for any reason should always consult with their instructors prior to absence (if possible). Both tardiness and early departure from class may be considered forms of absenceism. A student may be dropped if there are excessive absences. All material for the course is located on Blackboard.

Emails that do not satisfy these conditions will be ignored. *Please do not write emails as you would text or include the entire email body in the subject heading, and please be respectful to all.*
- 7. **Assessments:** All homework, quizzes, and assignments are due Sunday by midnight on the Blackboard website. You are encouraged to get ahead on assignments. Once the deadline has passed, your score will be zero with no make-up opportunity if it has not been completed, unless your instructor states differently. Blackboard will have a calendar displaying when all assignments and exams are due. It is the student's responsibility to frequently check this calendar. Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance: According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance. Faculty will provide the Office of Financial Aid with an electronic notification if a student has not attended the first week of class. Any student receiving federal financial aid who does not attend the first week of class will have their aid terminated and returned to the DoE. Please note that any student who stops attending at any time during the semester may also need to return a portion of their federal aid.

Writing, Language, and Digital Composing Center: The Writing, Language, and Digital Composing Center supports graduate and undergraduate students in all three colleges as well as faculty and staff. Tutors work with students to develop reading skills, prepare oral presentations, and plan, draft, and revise their written assignments. Our language tutors support students enrolled in Spanish courses and students composing in Spanish for any assignment. Our digital studio tutors support students working on digital projects such as eportfolios, class presentations, or other digital multimedia projects. Students can schedule appointments through JagWire under the Student Services tab. Click on "Writing, Language, and Digital Composing Center" to make your appointment. The Center offers face-to-face, synchronous online, and asynchronous digital appointments. <u>Meeting Basic Needs:</u> Any student who has difficulty affording groceries or accessing sufficient food to eat every day, or who lacks a safe and stable place to live, and believes this may affect their performance in the course, is urged to contact the Dean of Students (DOS@tamusa.edu) for support. Furthermore, please notify the professor if you are comfortable in doing so. This will enable them to provide any resources they may possess.

<u>Military Affairs:</u> Veterans and active-duty military personnel are welcomed and encouraged to communicate, in advance if possible, and special circumstances (e.g., upcoming deployment, drill requirements, disability accommodations). <u>Religious Observances:</u> Texas A&M University-San Antonio recognizes the diversity of faiths represented among the campus community and protects the rights of students, faculty, and staff to observe religious holidays according to their tradition. Under the policy, students are provided an opportunity to make up any examination, study, or work requirements that may be



missed due to a religious observance provided they notify their instructors before the end of the second week of classes for regular session classes.

<u>The Six-Drop Rule:</u> Students are subject to the requirements of Senate Bill (SB) 1231 passed by the Texas Legislature in 2007. SB 1231 limits students to a maximum of six (6) non-punitive course drops (i.e., courses a student chooses to drop) during their undergraduate careers. A non-punitive drop does not affect the student's GPA. However, course drops that exceed the maximum allowed by SB 1231 will be treated as "F" grades and will impact the student's GPA.

Statement of Harassment and Discrimination: Texas A&M University-San Antonio is committed to the fundamental principles of academic freedom, equality of opportunity and human dignity. To fulfill its multiple missions as an institution of higher learning, A&M-San Antonio encourages a climate that values and nurtures collegiality and the uniqueness of the individual within our state, nation, and world. All decisions and actions involving students and employees should be based on applicable law and individual merit. Texas A&M University-San Antonio, in accordance with applicable federal and state law, prohibits discrimination, including harassment, on the basis of race, color, sex, religion, national origin, age, disability, genetic information, veteran status, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, or pregnancy/parenting status. Individuals who believe they have experienced harassment or discrimination prohibited by this statement are encouraged to contact the appropriate offices within their respective units. A&M-San Antonio's Title IX Coordinator can support those impacted by such conduct in navigating campus life, accessing health and counseling services, providing academic and housing accommodations, and more. Please be aware that all A&M-San Antonio employees (other than those designated as confidential resources such as counselors and trained victim advocates) are required to report information about such discrimination and harassment to the university. This means that if you tell a faculty member about a situation of sexual harassment or sexual violence, or other related misconduct, the faculty member must share that information with the university's Title IX Coordinator (titleix@tamusa.edu, 210-784-2061, CAB 439K). If you wish to speak to a confidential employee who does not have this reporting requirement, you can contact the Student Counseling Center at (210) 784-1331 or visit them in Madla 120.

<u>Pregnant/Parenting Students:</u> Texas A&M-San Antonio does not require a pregnant or parenting student, solely because of that status or issues related to that status, to (1) take a leave of absence or withdraw from their degree or certificate program; (2) limit the student's studies; (3) participate in an alternative program; (4) change the student's major, degree, or certificate program; or (5) refrain from joining or cease participating in any course, activity, or



program at the University. The university will provide reasonable accommodations to pregnant students that would be provided to a student with a temporary medical condition and that are related to the health and safety of the student and the student's unborn child. These could include maintaining a safe distance from substances, areas, and activities known to be hazardous to pregnant individuals and their unborn child; excused absences because of illness or medical appointments; modified due dates for assignments; rescheduled tests/exams; taking a leave of absence; and being provided access to instructional materials and video recordings of lectures for excused absences, if these would be provided to any other student with an excused absence. Texas A&M-San Antonio has also designated the Title IX Coordinator as the liaison officer for current or incoming students who are the parent or guardian of a child younger than 18 years of age. The Title IX Coordinator can provide students with information regarding support services and other resources.

<u>Students' Rights and Responsibilities:</u> The following statement of students' rights and responsibilities is intended to reflect the philosophical base upon which University Student Rules are built. This philosophy acknowledges the existence of both rights and responsibilities, which is inherent to an individual not only as a student at Texas A&M University-San Antonio but also as a citizen of this country.

Students' Rights

- A student shall have the right to participate in a free exchange of ideas, and there shall be no University rule or administrative rule that in any way abridges the rights of freedom of speech, expression, petition and peaceful assembly as set forth in the U.S. Constitution.
- 2. Each student shall have the right to participate in all areas and activities of the University, free from any form of discrimination, including harassment, on the basis of race, color, national or ethnic origin, religion, sex, disability, age, sexual orientation, or veteran status in accordance with applicable federal and state laws.
- 3. A student has the right to personal privacy except as otherwise provided by law, and this will be observed by students and University authorities alike.
- 4. Each student subject to disciplinary action arising from violations of university student rules shall be assured a fundamentally fair process.

Students' Responsibilities



- 1. A student has the responsibility to respect the rights and property of others, including other students, the faculty and administration.
- 2. A student has the responsibility to be fully acquainted with the published University Student Rules found in the Student Handbook, Student Code of Conduct, on our website, University Catalog and to comply with them, as well as federal, state, and local laws.
- 3. A student has the responsibility to recognize that student actions reflect upon the individuals involved and upon the entire University community.
- 4. A student has the responsibility to recognize the University's obligation to provide an environment for learning.
- 5. A student has the responsibility to check their university email for any updates or official university notification.

We expect that students will behave in a manner that is dignified, respectful, and courteous to all people, regardless of sex, ethnic/racial origin, religious background, sexual orientation or disability. Behaviors that infringe on the rights of another individual will not be tolerated.

Students are expected to exhibit a high level of honesty and integrity in their pursuit of higher education. Students engaging in an act that violates the standards of academic integrity will find themselves facing academic and/or disciplinary sanctions. Academic misconduct is any act, or attempt, which gives an unfair advantage to the student. Additionally, any behavior specifically prohibited by a faculty member in the course syllabus or class discussion may be considered as academic misconduct.
