

### **Course Description**

Incidences, types, causation, patterns, processes, treatment agencies and research as related to juvenile delinquency.

Other Required Materials: Students are required to purchase access to the REVEL content in order to complete many of the course assignments. A copy of the textbook is accessible in REVEL. Please note that access to REVEL was not included with tuition. You need to purchase access to REVEL. If you go to the "Course Content" section, you will see registration instructions for REVEL as well as the link to access the REVEL content. Access to our Pearson REVEL content can be purchased directly from Pearson REVEL or from the bookstore. Since this is an online course, coursework will be completed online in Blackboard/REVEL. Students will need 1) computer or device that allows them to access the online class materials; 2) reliable internet access. Technological issues are not considered valid grounds

for late assignment submission. You must have a back-up way of accessing the internet to complete your course work in the event that your primary method is not reliable/working.

Student Learning Outcomes: Students who successfully master course content will:

- 1. Understand the basic theories that explain juvenile delinquency.
- 2. Understand juvenile delinquency as it interrelates with other systems including the family, the school and the courts.
- 3. Demonstrate a basic understanding of types of juvenile crime and delinquency in the U.S.
- 4. Identify factors that potentially cause juvenile delinquency, and understand basic treatment options regarding juvenile delinquency.
- 5. Provide students with an introduction to the research literature concerning juvenile delinquency and treatment outcomes.

# **Course Requirements and Grading System**

**Late Assignments:** Not accepted. Be mindful of all due dates and plan accordingly. Do not wait until the last minute to complete assignments.

**REVEL:** Each chapter in REVEL contains module quizzes (covering a section of a chapter), a chapter quiz (covering the entire chapter), and other activities (simulations).

For chapter quizzes you are allotted only 1 attempt. You can keep track of your quiz scores in the Performance tab. I will transfer your scores from REVEL to Blackboard each week. Your grades in REVEL do not automatically sync with Blackboard.

Most assignments open in Blackboard on Monday (except Week 1 – assignments open on Tuesday/First Day of Semester) at 12:00am and remain open for the entire week (close on Sunday at 11:59pm). Once the due date passes you are no longer able to complete the assignments for that week; thus, late submissions are not accepted. Be sure to pace yourself throughout the week and complete all of your assignments by the end of the applicable week.

**Exams:** There will be 4 exams given throughout the semester. The exams will consist of fill in the blank, multiple-choice and true/false questions. The exam dates are marked on the calendar below. It is expected that all students take their exams on the date listed on the calendar. All exams will cover the assigned reading material as well as other items located in the weekly module (videos, presentations, articles).

Online Discussion Questions/Peer Responses: In applicable weeks, there will be a discussion board question/assignment that will be completed online as well as 2 peer responses. These responses can be to either other class members' posts or the instructor's comments. The discussion question response must be at least 300 words in length. Do not post the discussion question response as a Word attachment. Use the discussion board response area to post your work. Posting Word attachments will be subject to a point reduction. Repeating the discussion question in the body of your response does not count towards the word count. The peer responses must be at least 100 words in length. Anything less will be considered unsubstantive and will have a point deduction rendered. Responses that only compliment another person's response (great job with your response. You did a great job explaining the topic and it helped me understand the content, etc.) and do not offer any substantive commentary on the actual topic of discussion will be subject to point reductions. The online discussion questions will

open for the applicable week on Monday at midnight. The discussion questions (your answers to the questions posed in the assignment) must be completed by Wednesday of the applicable week and the peer responses must be completed by Sunday, 11:59pm of the applicable week. If the initial response to the discussion questions is not completed by Thursday, a 10-point late penalty will be assessed for each day this section of the assignment is posted late. Once the Discussion Assignment window closes, it will not be reopened.

**Make-Up Examinations:** Make-up exams will not be given unless a student can provide appropriate cause for missing the exam. Examples of this would be: (a) illness that is certified with a licensed physician's note stating that the student should avoid participating in class functions; or (b) certifiable death or cataclysmic life course event that has an adverse effect on the student and that can be documented and/or verified.

# **Semester Projects - Written Assignment (Presentation)**

Please make sure that your assignments are formatted per APA.

As far as using outside research goes, <u>all assignments (presentation)</u> are expected to include scholarly <u>or peer-reviewed articles</u>. Please make sure that you include citations and references for all of your items that are sourced from the scholarly or peer-reviewed articles. Please make sure you are using your scholarly or peer-reviewed articles correctly. If you are unsure how to use outside materials, I recommend the utilization of the Jaguar Writing Center. If you have any questions, please let me know and I will do my best to help.

When choosing outside sources, stay away from Wikipedia, Ask.com, eHow, dictionaries and other non-academic/non-peer reviewed sources.

Specific assignment information for the Semester Project will be posted in the weekly module section. There will be 1 semester project in this course. This will entail the creation of a research-based PowerPoint Presentation regarding a Juvenile Delinquency topic (TBA). The subject will encompass many areas that we will explore throughout the course.
