Course Description: This course reviews works of Latinx drama and borderlands performance theory and challenges students to make critical connections among various styles, subgenres, and historical or social contexts. We will ask how these works explore the experiences of Latinx/Chicanx/Mexican-Americans. Our objective is to actively question the writing of borderlands performances, appropriations and theory, which, while connected, are distinct in their aims and impacts. This course is intended to more generally improve your critical thinking, reading, speaking, as well as research and writing skills, but is also concerned with the exploration of the self, especially how that relates to your future prospects in career and community.
