Course Requirements

<u>Quizzes</u> - There are also weekly quizzes in this course. You can take the quiz on the online text (see the link above) and they will be open on Monday at 6am and are due on Sunday at 11:59pm. Each quiz will cover the chapter for that week. Each quiz is worth 15 points and 1 point per

question. You have two attempts at the quiz and I will take the high score as your grade for that quiz (150 total points)

<u>Writing Assignments</u> – There are three writing assignments in this course. Each assignment will be open the week it is due on Monday and then due the Sunday of that week on Blackboard at 11:59pm. Each assignment will be approximately 2-4 pages in length and worth 50 points each (150 total points)

<u>Chapter Data Assignment</u> – Each chapter we go through has 1 short assignments embedded within dealing with analyzing data. You must complete each one for each chapter. They are completion grades so you simply must just do them to get credit. The assignments are due on Sunday at 11:59pm They are worth 5 points each (50 points).

<u>Discussion Board Posts</u> – Each Monday I will post a discussion question related to the weeks topic. Students are required to post at **least 2 responses**. One to the original post by me and one post to one of your fellow classmates post. These responses will be graded and are worth 10 points each. Your online participation will be evaluated on a quantity and quality basis. Your comments should advance the discussion, add value, and be relevant. Comments such as "I agree" and "ditto" are not considered value-added participation. Therefore, when you agree or disagree with a comment, please state and support your agreement or disagreement. The posts are due on Sundays at 11:59pm (200 points total)

Attendance Policy

This course is online and asynchronous so there is no attendance *per se*. However, the class is structured for students to progress through specific topics weekly. Although you have the entire week to complete the assignments you still need to complete them in that time frame. This is not a class you can put off until the end of the semester and try and race through to finish in the last few weeks. You must "attend" to the assignments weekly.

Make-Up Assignments

I will not accept late assignments. However, during the last week of the semester, I have that time scheduled as "make up time." This means students can make up ONE assignment that they missed throughout the semester.

Rules and Guidelines for (Blackboard) Discussion

Use the following conventions when composing a discussion posting:

- 1. During a Discussion assignment, deadlines for posting to and replying will be specified with each assignment. It is a good practice to always check the Discussions multiple times during the week.
- 2. If you want to send a personal message to the instructor or to another student, use e-mail rather than the discussions
- 3. Use the appropriate Discussion Topic; don't post everything on the "Main" Discussion Topic.
- 4. Be patient. Don't expect an immediate response when you send a message.
- 5. A helpful hint for use with both discussions and e-mail --- Compose your message in your word-processing application in order to check spelling, punctuation, and grammar -- then copy and paste your composition into e-mail or the discussion. This also saves online time.
- 6. Everyone should feel free to participate in online discussions. Regular and meaningful discussion postings constitute a substantial portion of your grade.
- 7. Respect each other's ideas, feelings and experience.
- 8. Be courteous and considerate. It is important to be honest and to express yourself freely, but being considerate of others is just as important and expected online, as it is in the classroom.
- 9. Explore disagreements and support assertions with data and evidence.
- 10. "Subject" headings: use something that is descriptive and refer to a particular assignment or discussion topic when applicable.
- 11. Use the "reply" button rather than the "compose" button if you are replying to someone else's posting.
- 12. Do not use postings such as "I agree," "I don't know either," "Who cares," or "ditto." They do not add to the discussion, take up space on the Discussions, and will not be counted for assignment credit.
- 13. Avoid posting large blocks of text. If you must, break them into paragraphs and use a space between paragraphs.

Penalties for Academic Dishonesty

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance:

According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance. Faculty will provide the Office of Financial Aid with an electronic notification if a student has not attended the first week of class. Any student receiving federal financial aid who does not attend the first week of class will have their aid terminated and returned to the DoE. Please note that any student who stops attending at any time during the semester may also need to return a portion of their federal aid.

The Six-Drop Rule:

Students are subject to the requirements of Senate Bill (SB) 1231 passed by the Texas Legislature in 2007. SB 1231 limits students to a maximum of six (6) non-punitive course drops (i.e., courses a student chooses to drop) during their undergraduate careers. A non-punitive drop does not affect the student's GPA. However, course drops that exceed the maximum allowed by SB 1231 will be treated as "F" grades and will impact the student's GPA.
