Course Purpose and Philosophy:

The purpose of the course is to stimulate a better understanding of the role of gender and traditional perceptions of gender ideologies in the conduct of war, mass violence, and genocide. It evaluates the manner by which men and women are involved in acts of violence and mass murder either as perpetrators, victims, or witnesses to such atrocity. It also interrogates the gendered dynamics of war and warfare and explores the way in which conflict promotes acts of mass killing, ethnic cleansing, or genocide as well as the effects of such violence on existing gender roles and identities.

At the conclusion of the course, you will have an understanding of the way in which gender as an analytical category helps us to think about violence in a historical and contemporary context. We will examine the ways in which the social and cultural construction of specific gender roles affects the application of force and violence, but also how these roles can be redefined as a result of war and genocide. We also will examine the differential gendered impact of acts of physical and sexual violence involved with war and genocide. The quality and depth of intellectual rigor that you bring into the classroom each day will determine the value that you receive from the course and the benefits that accrue to you today and in the future. I look forward to our journey together.

Course Objectives:

- Identify and understand the definitional challenges associated with framing genocide.
- Identify and analyze the role played by gender in the conduct of violence and genocide.
- Analyze the manner by which traditional gender ideologies influence a society's perceptions of the expected role of men and women.
- Analyze the role of social and cultural contexts related to the use of statesponsored violence and the effects of such violence on gender relations.
- Analyze the behavior of male and female perpetrators, victims, and bystanders in specific historical contexts.
- Communicate clearly and concisely in written and verbal assignments.

CLASSROOM PARTICIPATION:

These points will be based on the quality of your contributions to discussions in the classroom. Learning is a "student-centered" activity that requires your thoughtful participation and analysis of ideas presented during class. You will be graded on the quality of your contributions to the class and your ability to analyze and discuss course concepts in the classroom.

QUIZZES/BOOK QUIZZES:

These points will be based on short assessments of student learning objectives from the readings and classroom lectures.

BLACKBOARD DISCUSSIONS:

Students will participate weekly in a blackboard discussion. Primary source readings will be provided each week for evaluation, and students will post responses to the questions posed. Student responses should be <u>at least one complete paragraph of no less than 150 words</u>. The discussion grade will be based upon four factors: (1) evidence used to support your response, (2) level of analysis (3) length/completeness of the response, and (4) writing style/proofreading. The written primary source discussion boards will open on Thursday at 2:00 pm each week and close on Tuesday at <u>9:00 pm</u>, there is no excuse not to participate.

FINAL ESSAY:

In lieu of a final exam, there will be a final course paper due that will be focused on key themes from the course and utilizing evidence and readings from the entire course. I will provide additional information on the requirements for the paper during the semester.

Attendance Policy

Regular attendance is required. I take attendance at the beginning of class and we conduct community building at the start of class so being on time is important to your learning experience. Early departures from class should be cleared with the instructor before the start of class. As much of the course work happens in class, missing 25% of the classes or more will result in a minimum of a letter grade deduction from the final grade. This includes both excused and unexcused absences. This does not include university-sanctioned absences for which I receive notification from the University. All students (whether present or absent) are responsible for all announcements made in class and all assignments given in class because it is sometimes necessary to make changes to the syllabus.

Cell Phone Policy

Make-up Exam Policy

Based on instructor discretion, students may be allowed to take a make-up exam in the event of extraordinary circumstances that prevent the student from taking the exam at the scheduled time. Late Assignments

An assignment is considered to be late if it is not turned in at the start of the class period during which the assignment is due. Late assignments without an acceptable excuse as determined by the instructor will be recorded as a zero or may incur a penalty.

The Six-Drop Rule
