ABOUT THE COURSE:

Course Description:

Intermediate Studio is a topics based studio course that will guide students through research methods, creative ideation, a general introduction to art theory, and the development of a creative art making practice. Students will be encouraged to make their own creative decisions throughout the course of the class as they respond to topics in contemporary art. There is no assigned mode of art making in this class and students are free to explore any materials or practice pending instructor approval.

This is a studio art class for students interested in developing an individual creative practice. Previous experience with art making is helpful in this course, but not required.

COURSE STRUCTURE:

This course will be facilitated by:

• Art Bootcamp:

In-class studio workshop exercises that will challenge students to think fast and outside of the box.

• Topics Based Projects:

Long-form assignments that will ask students to research and execute a work of art in response to an assigned topic.

Assignment Critiques:

Friendly group discussions in which students learn to observe, analyze, and articulate observations and feedback to their peers.

• Image Presentations/Lectures:

These lectures will introduce information relevant to course and project content.

• Assigned Reading Discussions:

These discussion board posts will will serve as sites of engagement and analysis of assigned reading.

• Journal Entries:

These journal entires will serve as sites of research and planning for Topics Based Projects. They will be completed on Blackboard.

BASIC EXPECTATIONS:

Standards of Campus Conduct:

Attendance Policy:

- You will be able to accrue 4 absences without penalty in this class. These absences will not alter due dates, and reading guizzes cannot be made up.
- •The 5th absence will lower your course grade one full letter grade. Each additional absence will also lower your course grade by one full letter grade.
- •Students who accumulate 7 absences will automatically fail the course and are encouraged to drop the course.
- Be aware that you are only permitted a total of 6 drops without penalty in your undergraduate career. The 7th drop will be calculated as an F in your GPA. Be cautious about casually dropping classes.
- Arriving late or leaving class early may be considered an absence.
- Arriving to class unprepared may be considered as absent.
- Working on other class materials or not actively participating may be considered an absence.
- Attendance is calculated for each day of

class meetings. Students enrolling after the first class day are counted absent for the days missed prior to enrollment. (Students struggling with attendance are encouraged to work with the Student Academic Success Center.)

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance:

According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which includes class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance. Faculty will provide the Office of Financial Aid with an electronic notification if a student has not attended the first week of class. Any student receiving Federal financial aid who dos not attend the first week of class will have his/her aid terminated and returned to the DoE. Academic Dishonesty:

Students are expected to do their own course work. First offenses cheating or plagiarism by an individual student may be handled by the instructor after consultation with the department chair. The student is usually confronted with the evidence in private and advised of the penalty to be assessed. The evidence will be retained for at least one full year.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

Bootcamp Assignments:

Students will complete a series of short in-class studio workshop exercises that will challenge students to think fast and outside of the box. These assignments will take place in the first three weeks of the semester and should be viewed as informal experiments.

Topics Based Projects:

Students will execute four long-form assignments that will ask students to research and execute a work of art in response to an assigned topic. major grades for the course. These projects will involve lectures, reading, and research.

Assigned Reading Discussions:

Students will be assigned readings throughout the semester. They will annotate and respond to those readings in Discussion Board posts on Blackboard. These will posts that will serve as sites sof engagement and analysis of assigned reading.

Journal Entries:

Students will be required to map out the research and planning of their Topics Based Projects via Blackboard Journal entires. These will serve as sites of research and planning and can be informal in nature.

Final Portfolio

Students will document their work and submit a digital portfolio of all art made in the class at the end of the semester to encourage best professional practices.
