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<u>Text:</u> Feldman, R. (2019) Lifespan Development: A Topical Approach. 4th Edition, Hoboken, NJ. Pearson.

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<u>Course Description</u>: A survey of development from birth through childhood, adolescence, adulthood, old age, and death. Physical, cognitive, socioemotional, and social issues over the lifespan will be examined.

Course Goals and Objectives:

1. Students will develop an understanding and appreciation of the major theories of human development, including cognitive theories, psychosocial theories, and personality theories, with an emphasis on the effect of physiological processes on development.

2. Students will learn to apply developmental theories to real-life psychological and/or educational settings.

Assessment of Student Learner Outcomes Students will evince attainment of course objectives through their performance on unit exams, quizzes, and projects.

Assignements :

Self-Introduction : (1) self-introduction will allow surdents the opportunity to highlight some their best qualities and communication skills with classmates and instructor.

Quizzes : (5) quizzes will be given durning the semester. Each exam, except the final, is worth an equal amount to the final grade. Your average can be calculated by finding the number of

points you have earned and dividing it by the total possible number of points. The quizzes are open book.

Final exam: (1) comprehensive final exam will be given during the final exam period. This exam will count as one- and one-half regular exams.

Journaling: There will be (12) journal entries. According to expert opinion, journaling allows you to create and maintain a dialogue with yourself about your goals—what they are, how you'll reach them, and your progress and challenges along the way. Articulating and tracking your goals in writing makes them real, increasing your motivation and personal accountability.

Discussion: There will be (3) discussions among classmates. This will give you an opportunity to talk about various topics as they relate to scientific research.

Chapter Summary: There will be (4) chapter summaries as they will help you gain a better understanding of important events, key characters, and memorable dialogue in a chapter of a book.

Self-Reflection: There will be (1) brief self-reflection essay. Allows students to reflect on how they see things going on at Texas A&M University-San Antonio, and how they've gotten from point A to point B.

Course Grades:

Each student's grade will be based solely on his/her performance. Students will not compete against one another for grades (i.e., the instructor will not limit the number of As, Bs, etc.). An individual's course grade is based on his or her raw score points (i.e., the total number of points earned during the semester). For example, using the table below, a student who earns 900 points during the semester will earn a "A." A student who has a total of 800 points at the end of the semester will earn a "B" in the course.

Class Participation:

Very few students who miss a lot of coursework perform well in the course. Since you are paying a lot of money per class period, it is to your advantage to login daily. I do include participation in my grading system for final grade points at the end of semester, because class participation depends on meeting deadlines for submitting required assignments on time. Students who login every class day and participate in all required assignments will receive extra credit. You might find it advantageous to drop the class and retake it if you miss several required assignments. You need to take responsibility for your missed work FIRST, then contact me for help if you still need it. I will be VERY willing to help you when you show me that you have put some prior effort into the missed material. This is for your benefit too--if you have worked with the material already, my help sessions will be much more useful to you.

Make-Up or Late Work:

Assignments which are turned in on time must be turned in on the date which it is due unless I have specified another time. Each day the assignment is late, **(ten) points** will be taken off the grade for the assignment. For example, if a student turns in a perfect assignment two days late,

the grade for the assignment will be 80. There are **NO** makeup quizzes or final exam. As they are online. Quizzes will open a week in advance of the due date, giving you enough time to complete them.

***If you are in the hospital, you must email me **BEFORE** the quiz. Notifying me beforehand does not guarantee you will be able to make it up, but your request will be heard. If you are leaving town on a planned trip, take it before you leave. ***

There are **NO** exceptions for computer malfunction, if you understand your home computer is not working properly, take your quizzes and final at the university. This is an online course. Make sure your computer is in its very best working order at all times during the semester. At **NO** time will I hear about your computer problems.

Please be respectful of others. Be very careful what you communicate via online during discussions. What is said does not always stay in the course room.

Course Email

In preference to emailing me and my response back to you in a timely manner. I usually read and respond to emails twice a day. But my policy/standard is to respond back to you within 24-48 hours.

Keep in mind, every email does not require me to respond to them. Emails are for business purposes (i.e., assignments) only. Sometimes students get lucky, and I am online at the time an email comes in, and I respond then, but not always.

Texas A&M University-San Antonio does not require me to respond to your emails on the weekend. For example, if you email on Saturday; I will respond back to you during business hour Monday.
